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SUMÁRIO EXECUTIVO

A CONVENÇÃO QUADRO DAS NAÇÕES UNIDAS SOBRE MUDANÇA DO CLIMA - UNFCCC, adotada na Conferência Mundial - Rio-92, criou a Conferência das Partes - COP, que se tornou a autoridade máxima da Convenção. Desde 1995, se reúne anualmente para formalizar acordos entre os países membros (Partes) com intuito de mitigar mudanças do clima.

Para o Brasil, esta décima Conferência foi de particular importância por três motivos: pelo fato dessa reunião ser realizada na Argentina, destino de fácil acesso aos interessados no tema; pela perspectiva de entrada em vigor do Protocolo de Quioto e seu Mecanismo de desenvolvimento Limpo em 16 de fevereiro de 2005, o que eleva o perfil do assunto no âmbito nacional; pela formalização da divulgação pelo Brasil à Convenção, de sua Primeira Comunicação Nacional (síntese dos inventários nacionais de emissões de gases de efeito estufa por setor, cuja elaboração de dois deles, ficou sob a responsabilidade da CETESB: "Emissões de Metano pelo Manejo de Resíduos e "Emissões Veiculares"). A divulgação desses dados referentes à 1990 a 1994 que vinha sendo adiada pelo governo brasileiro, foi feita em coordenação com a China, divulgando também em Buenos Aires, sua Primeira Comunicação Nacional.

Tal fato deverá trazer considerável repercussão internacional entre os formadores de opinião na sociedade brasileira.

Quanto à participação da CETESB nas COPs e seu constante envolvimento em questões relacionadas ao tema Mudanças Climáticas, justifica-se sob vários aspectos.

Do ponto de vista sócio econômico, o Estado de São Paulo tem muitas oportunidades no âmbito do mercado de carbono.

Do ponto de vista político, é preciso reconhecer a importância da participação e do entendimento do tema.

Do ponto de vista profissional, estabelece-se uma rede de contatos, que possibilita intercâmbio de informações e atualizações.

Finalmente, em relação aos limites técnicos das atribuições da CETESB, ficou claro com a participação na Conferência, que é possível conseguir co-benefícios entre mitigação da mudança climática e o controle da poluição atmosférica, uma vez que essas emissões têm as mesmas fontes de origem.

Ficou evidente que esses benefícios podem ser maiores em países em desenvolvimento e implicam em economia de custos na área da saúde e no controle da poluição.

1- INTRODUÇÃO

A CETESB, Companhia Estadual de Tecnologia de Saneamento Ambiental, é responsável, principalmente, pela emissão de licenças ambientais, legislação ambiental, prevenção, fiscalização e controle ambientais, preparação e atendimento a emergências, gestão ambiental, produção mais limpa e diagnóstico ambiental. Além disso, coordena a implementação do PROCLIMA, Programa Estadual de Mudanças Climáticas desde 1995. Este programa tem como objetivos apoiar o governo Federal no cumprimento de compromissos assumidos nos fóruns internacionais de meio ambiente.

A estrutura de funcionamento do PROCLIMA baseia-se na Divisão de Questões Globais (PTQ) da CETESB. Dentre as suas atividades, incluem-se a elaboração de inventário e revisão do seu método junto ao IPCC (Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudanças Climáticas); o monitoramento da produção científica nacional a esse respeito, inserindo-a no contexto de mudanças climáticas, a pesquisa, principalmente pelo seu fomento junto a universidades públicas e privadas, bem como instituições de pesquisa; a transferência de Tecnologia, participando de seminários, debates, grupos de trabalho e oferecendo cursos de especialização e pós graduação relacionados ao tema. Também atende regularmente a consultas públicas a respeito de Mudanças Climáticas.

Em relação à Representação Institucional, a PTQ vem representando, em nível nacional e internacional, o Sistema Estadual de Meio Ambiente em diversas palestras, mesas redondas e comitês técnicos a esse respeito.

Neste ano, a ABEMA – Associação de Entidades Estaduais de Meio Ambiente, indicou representantes da CETESB para participar da COP-10, em Buenos Aires, de 06 a 17 de dezembro de 2004.

Com essa missão, a secretária executiva do PROCLIMA, Engenheira Dione Z A. Pradella (PTQ), participou de reuniões preparatórias no Ministério de Relações Exteriores/Itamaraty-DF, para instruções e informes à delegação brasileira sobre a Conferência Mundial.

2- INFORMAÇÕES GERAIS A RESPEITO DAS COPs

A Conferência das Partes – COP é a autoridade máxima da CONVENÇÃO QUADRO DAS NAÇÕES UNIDAS SOBRE MUDANÇA DO CLIMA - UNFCCC, adotada na Conferência Mundial - Rio-92. Tem a responsabilidade de manter regularmente sob exame a implementação da Convenção, assim como quaisquer instrumentos jurídicos que a Conferência das Partes vier a adotar, além de tomar decisões necessárias para promover a efetiva implementação da Convenção (art. 7º da Convenção sobre Mudança do Clima). (ANEXO 1: Documento - Convenção sobre Mudança do Clima) e (ANEXO 2: histórico sobre as negociações internacionais)

3 - JUSTIFICATIVA PARA A CETESB PARTICIPAR DAS COPs E EVENTOS CORRELATOS

O tema Mudança Global do Clima tem sido considerado um dos mais sérios problemas da humanidade e ameaça à saúde humana, atividades econômicas, recursos naturais, entre outros.

Traz implicações regionais/locais e é de responsabilidade federal, estadual e municipal. Tem mobilizado em grande escala, recursos financeiros em todo o mundo, mesmo antes do Protocolo de Quioto (adotado na COP-3, no Japão) entrar em vigor (com a ratificação do Protocolo de Quioto, pela Federação Russa em novembro de 2004, isso ocorrerá em 16 de fevereiro de 2005). (ANEXO 3: Documento - Protocolo de Quioto)

O reflexo de tal fato pode ser observado pela notícia do Estadão de 7/12/04: "BM&F (Bolsa de Mercadorias e Futuros) lança mercado de carbono no Brasil".

O mercado de carbono no âmbito do Protocolo de Quioto com seus mecanismos de flexibilização, entre eles o MDL, Mecanismo de Desenvolvimento Limpo, é um pequeno passo (de proporções mundiais) em relação ao desafio planetário de reduzir as emissões dos gases de efeito estufa lançadas na atmosfera pelas atividades antrópicas.

Quanto à participação da CETESB nas COPs, justifica-se sob vários aspectos.

Do ponto de vista sócio econômico, o Estado de São Paulo tem muitas oportunidades no âmbito do mercado de carbono.

Do ponto de vista político, é preciso reconhecer a importância da participação e do entendimento do tema.

Do ponto de vista profissional, estabelece-se uma rede de contatos, "net working", que possibilita intercâmbio de informações que já se estende, antes do término da Conferência. (ANEXO 4: Correio eletrônico de Buenos Aires, relatando temas de interesse, após retorno da funcionária)

Finalmente, em relação aos limites técnicos das atribuições da CETESB, ficou claro com a participação na Conferência que é possível conseguir co-benefícios entre mitigação da mudança climática e o controle da poluição atmosférica, uma vez que essas emissões têm as mesmas fontes de origem.

Foi citado durante apresentação da COP-10, trabalho científico de projeção, demonstrando que com a redução de 15% nas emissões de dióxido de carbono (um dos principais gases de efeito estufa) na Europa, em 2020, simultaneamente se conseguiria a redução de dióxido de enxofre, óxido de nitrogênio e material particulado. Ficou evidente que esses benefícios podem ser maiores em países em desenvolvimento e implicariam em economia de custos na área da saúde e no controle da poluição. 4 - A COP-10

Participaram da COP-10, aproximadamente 5000 pessoas, de 180 países diferentes dentre as quais, negociadores de tratados internacionais, relacionados à problemática da Mudança Global do Clima.

Fizeram parte da delegação brasileira, representantes da CETESB, Engenheira Dione Pradella e da Secretaria do Meio Ambiente, Dra Suani Coelho. (FOTO 1); ANEXO 6 (lista dos participantes de todos os países, incluindo as autoridades nacionais de cada Delegação)

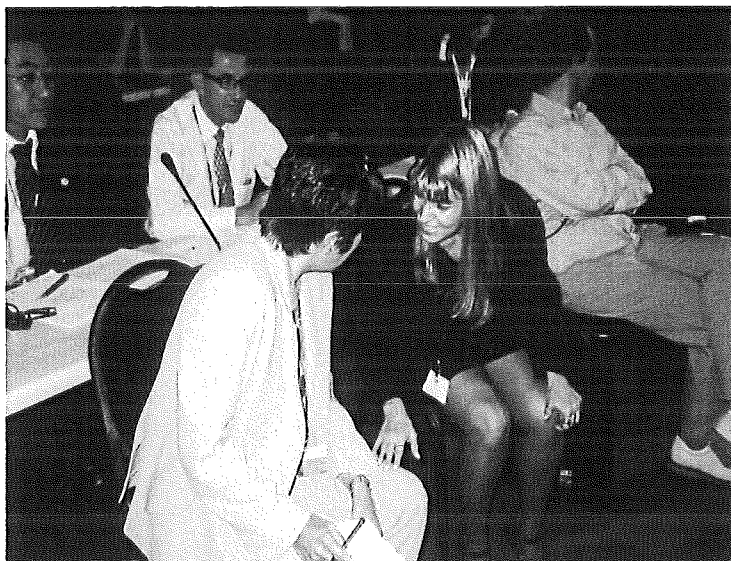

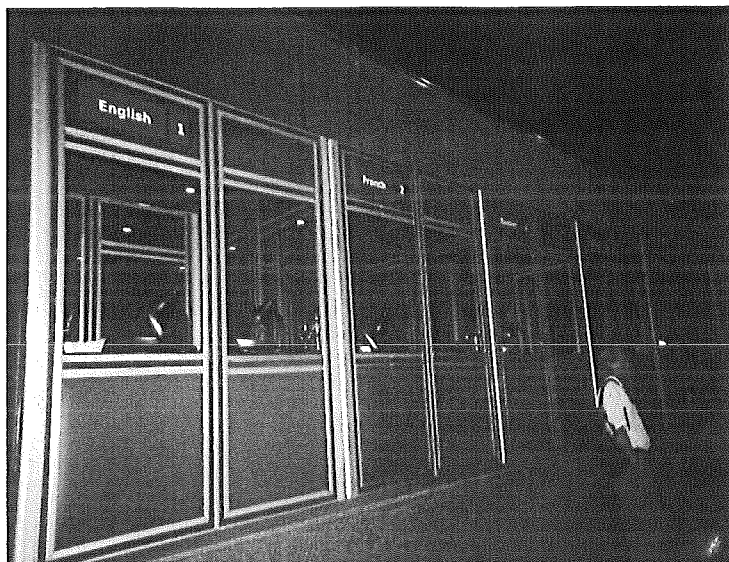

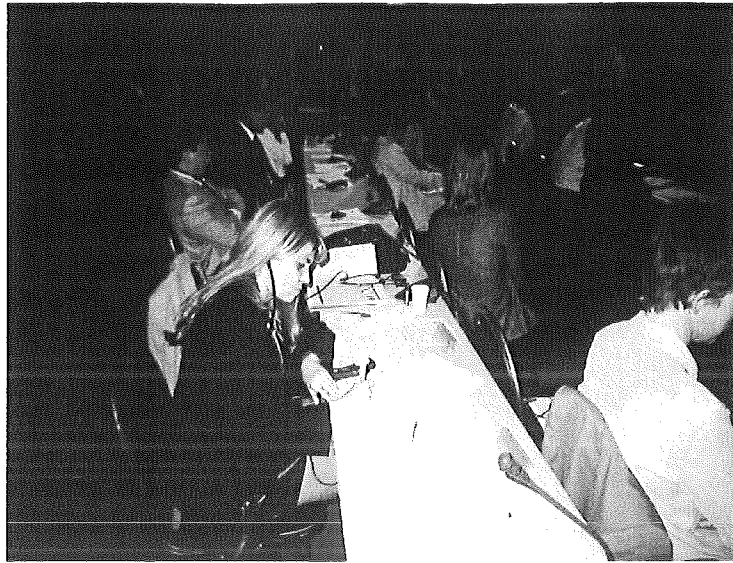

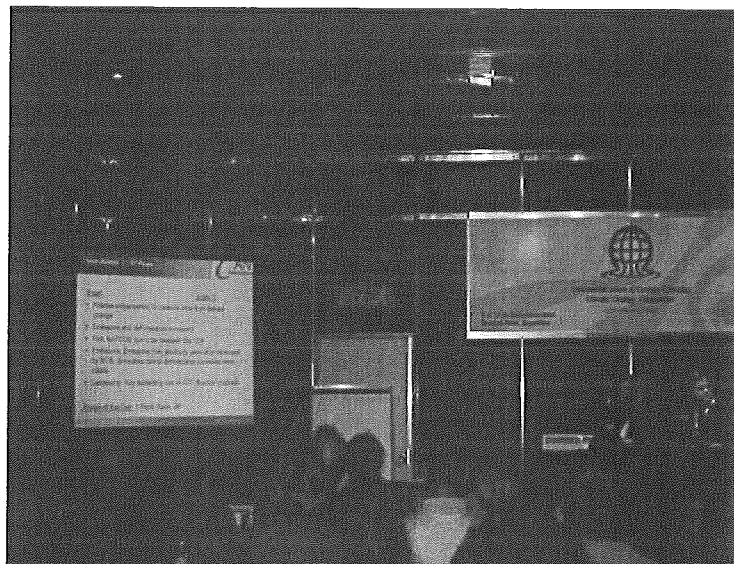

4.2 RESUMO INFORMATIVO À DELEGAÇÃO BRASILEIRA

Contexto geral

- O regime internacional sobre mudança do clima sofreu positiva alteração com a adesão russa ao Protocolo de Quioto. A COP-10 foi marcada pela certeza da entrada em vigor do Protocolo, em fevereiro de 2005 e pela conseqüente revitalização de um regime que muitos julgavam superado. Especial atenção foi dada à discussão sobre o segundo período de cumprimento do Protocolo (2013 em diante).

Para o Brasil, esta décima Conferência é de particular importância por três motivos:

- a- pela decisão brasileira de divulgar sua Primeira Comunicação Nacional à Convenção do Clima, com o Inventário Nacional de Emissões de Gases de Efeito Estufa. Deverá trazer considerável repercussão internacional e entre os formadores de opinião na sociedade brasileira
- b- pelo fato dessa reunião ser realizada na Argentina, destino de fácil acesso aos interessados no tema
- c- pela perspectiva de entrada em vigor do Protocolo de Quioto e seu Mecanismo de desenvolvimento Limpo, o que eleva o perfil do assunto no âmbito nacional.

Desta forma houve considerável interesse das esferas do Governo, bem como da sociedade civil, em participarem da Conferência.

- O Brasil formalizou a divulgação de sua Primeira Comunicação Nacional à Convenção em um evento paralelo organizado em conjunto com o Secretariado da UNFCCC. A divulgação foi feita em coordenação com a China que também divulgou em Buenos Aires, sua Primeira Comunicação Nacional. Salienta-se que vários países (Partes) já apresentaram sua Comunicação Nacional, sendo que alguns, já estão mais adiantados, como o Uruguai que já está preparando sua quinta Comunicação Nacional.

- Embora na COP-10 prevaleçam os assuntos políticos diplomáticos, certas discussões dos aspectos técnicos também exigiram atenção das delegações. As reuniões dos órgãos subsidiários para implementação (SBI) e para assessoramento científico (SBSTA) tiveram o ritmo de suas discussões determinado pela capacidade das Partes em alcançarem o consenso nas tratativas políticas no âmbito da COP-10.

- Três decisões que foram adotadas até o final da segunda semana da Conferência, interessam particularmente ao Brasil: projetos florestais de pequena escala baseados no mecanismo do desenvolvimento limpo; adaptação à mudança climática; termos de referência para seminário sobre o futuro do regime de mudança do clima, a ser realizado em 2005.

- A minuta de decisão sobre projetos florestais de pequena escala, concluiu o processo de regulamentação do primeiro período de cumprimento do Protocolo de Quioto. Foi objeto de negociação durante o SUBSTA (Bonn, 14- 25/06/04), em grupo de contato presidido pela Dra. Thelma Krug, no qual o Conselheiro André Corrêa Lago atuou como representante do G77+China. Desta negociação na Alemanha, ficaram poucos colchetes remanescentes no texto, que foram discutidos no decorrer da COP-10. São passagens referentes a três questões básicas: critérios para contabilização das remoções líquidas anuais de CO₂; determinação de áreas elegíveis para implementação de projetos por comunidades e indivíduos de baixa renda; possibilidade de agrupamento de projetos de pequena escala, prática conhecida como "bundling". A delegação, com a coordenação da Dra. Thelma Krug, para esta matéria, buscou um compromisso entre a simplificação de procedimentos em projetos de pequena escala, com vistas à redução de custos e a

definição de critérios que assegurem a eficácia e a integridade ambiental do Protocolo de Quioto.

- A fim de construir uma agenda positiva para a Conferência, em vista das incertezas que antecederam a ratificação do Protocolo de Quioto pela Rússia, a COP-10 deu especial ênfase à adaptação à mudança do clima, que tem merecido atenção menor que o tema da mitigação nas COPs anteriores e outros foros internacionais. Foi importante aproveitar o momento favorável para superar os impasses que marcaram a discussão no SBI 20 (Bonn,14-25/06/04), fazendo com que o projeto de decisão sobre a matéria permanecesse inteiramente entre colchetes. A principal controvérsia referia-se à correlação, defendida pela Arábia Saudita, entre a adaptação à mudança do clima e aos impactos econômicos das medidas de resposta (redução do uso de combustíveis fósseis). A delegação buscou criar consensos dentro do G77+CHINA, ressaltando a importância do tema para os países em desenvolvimento e as incertezas quanto às perspectivas de redução do consumo de petróleo no curto e médio prazos.

- Em reunião preparatória realizada em Buenos Aires de 5 a 7 de setembro passado, foi acertada a realização, em 2005, de um seminário para discussão do futuro regime de mudança do clima. No contexto dos dez anos da entrada da Convenção do Clima, vislumbrou-se um debate amplo sobre ações futuras nas áreas de adaptação e mitigação da mudança do clima, bem como de desenvolvimento e transferência de tecnologias aplicáveis a essas áreas. A Argentina como país-sede, encaminhou a negociação da decisão, definindo os termos de referência para esse seminário, incluindo a questão do segundo período de cumprimento do Protocolo de Quioto (pós 2012).

Contexto específico (apresentações brasileiras)

Foi realizado em 8/12, Workshop do SBSTA sobre aspectos tecnológicos da adaptação à mudança à mudança do clima. O Dr. José Marengo fez breve apresentação sobre a experiência do CPTEC/INPE na adaptação de modelos computacionais para simulação do clima futuro em escala regional.

Foi realizado em 9/12 Workshop sobre opções tecnológicas na área de mitigação da mudança do clima, com foco em tecnologias energéticas de baixa emissão. Houve duas grandes áreas temáticas: tecnológicas em fase de desenvolvimento, com ênfase em hidrogênio e tecnologias já existentes. Nesta última área o Dr. Alfred Swarc, ex diretor da CETESB, fez apresentação sobre a experiência brasileira no setor de biocombustível (etanol e biodiesel).

ARTIGO 24

RESERVAS

Nenhuma reserva pode ser feita a esta Convenção.

ARTIGO 25

DENÚNCIA

1. Após três anos da entrada em vigor da Convenção para uma Parte, essa Parte pode, a qualquer momento, denunciá-la por meio de notificação escrita ao Depositário.
2. Essa denúncia tem efeito um ano após à data de seu recebimento pelo Depositário, ou em data posterior se assim for estipulado na notificação de denúncia.
3. Deve ser considerado que qualquer Parte que denuncie esta Convenção denuncia também os protocolos de que é Parte.

ARTIGO 26

TEXTOS AUTÊNTICOS

O original desta Convenção, cujos textos em árabe, chinês, espanhol, francês, inglês e russo são igualmente autênticos, deve ser depositado junto ao Secretário-Geral das Nações Unidas.

EM FÉ DO QUE, os abaixo assinados, devidamente autorizados para esse fim, firmam esta Convenção.

FEITA em Nova York aos nove dias de maio de mil novecentos e noventa e dois.

BRASIL

3. O Fundo para o Meio Ambiente Mundial, do Programa das Nações Unidas para o Desenvolvimento, do Programa das Nações Unidas para o Meio Ambiente e do Banco Internacional para a Reconstrução e o Desenvolvimento, será a entidade internacional encarregada provisoriamente do funcionamento do mecanismo financeiro a que se refere o Artigo 11. Nesse contexto, o Fundo para o Meio Ambiente Mundial deve ser adequadamente reestruturado e sua composição universalizada para permitir-lhe cumprir os requisitos do Artigo 11.

ARTIGO 22

RATIFICAÇÃO, ACEITAÇÃO, APROVAÇÃO OU ADESÃO

1. Esta Convenção está sujeita a ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão de Estados e organizações de integração econômica regional. Estará aberta a adesões a partir do dia seguinte à data em que a Convenção não mais esteja aberta a assinaturas. Os instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão devem ser depositados junto ao Depositário.

2. Qualquer organização de integração econômica regional que se torne parte desta Convenção, sem que seja Parte nenhum de seus Estados-Membros, deve ficar sujeita a todas as obrigações previstas nesta Convenção. No caso de um ou mais Estados-Membros dessas organizações serem Parte desta Convenção, a organização e seus Estados-Membros devem decidir sobre suas respectivas responsabilidades para o cumprimento de suas obrigações previstas nesta Convenção. Nesses casos, as organizações e os Estados-Membros não podem exercer simultaneamente direitos estabelecidos pela Convenção.

3. Em seus instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão, as organizações de integração econômica regional devem declarar o âmbito de suas competências no que respeita a assuntos regidos por esta Convenção. Essas organizações devem também informar ao Depositário de qualquer modificação substancial no âmbito de suas competências, o qual, por sua vez, deve transmitir essas informações às Partes.

ARTIGO 23

ENTRADA EM VIGOR

1. Esta Convenção entra em vigor no nonagésimo dia após a data de depósito do quinquagésimo instrumento de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão.

2. Para cada Estado ou organização de integração econômica regional que ratifique, aceite ou aprove esta Convenção ou a ela adira após o depósito do quinquagésimo instrumento de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão, esta Convenção entra em vigor no nonagésimo dia após a data de depósito do instrumento de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão desse Estado ou organização de integração econômica regional.



ARTIGO 18

DIREITO DE VOTO

1. Cada Parte desta Convenção tem direito a um voto, à exceção do disposto no parágrafo 2 abaixo.
2. As organizações de integração econômica regional devem exercer, em assuntos de sua competência, seu direito de voto com um número de votos igual ao número de seus Estados-Membros Partes desta Convenção. Essas organizações não devem exercer seu direito de voto se qualquer de seus Estados-Membros exercer esse direito e vice-versa.

ARTIGO 19

DEPOSITÁRIO

O Secretário-Geral das Nações Unidas será o Depositário desta Convenção e de protocolos adotados em conformidade com o Artigo 17.

ARTIGO 20

ASSINATURA

Esta Convenção estará aberta, no Rio de Janeiro, à assinatura de Estados-Membros das Nações Unidas ou de quaisquer de seus organismos especializados, ou que sejam Partes do Estatuto da Corte Internacional de Justiça, e de organizações de integração econômica regional, durante a realização da Conferência das Nações Unidas sobre o Meio Ambiente e Desenvolvimento, e posteriormente na sede das Nações Unidas em Nova York de 20 de junho de 1992 a 19 de junho de 1993.

ARTIGO 21

DISPOSIÇÕES TRANSITÓRIAS

1. As funções do Secretariado, a que se refere o Artigo 8, devem ser desempenhadas provisoriamente pelo Secretariado estabelecido pela Assembléia Geral das Nações Unidas em sua resolução 45/212 de 21 de dezembro de 1990, até que a Conferência das Partes conclua sua primeira sessão.
2. O chefe do Secretariado provisório, a que se refere o parágrafo 1 acima, deve cooperar estreitamente com o Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima, a fim de assegurar que esse Painel preste assessoramento científico e técnico objetivo. Outras instituições científicas pertinentes também podem ser consultadas.



ARTIGO 16

ADOÇÃO DE ANEXOS E EMENDAS AOS ANEXOS DA CONVENÇÃO

1. Os anexos desta Convenção constituem parte integrante da mesma e, salvo se expressamente disposto de outro modo, qualquer referência a esta Convenção constitui ao mesmo tempo referência a qualquer de seus anexos. Sem prejuízo do disposto no Artigo 14, parágrafo 2, alínea (b) e parágrafo 7, esses anexos devem conter apenas listas, formulários e qualquer outro material descritivo que trate de assuntos científicos, técnicos, processuais ou administrativos.
2. Os anexos desta Convenção devem ser propostos e adotados de acordo com o procedimento estabelecido no Artigo 15, parágrafos 2, 3 e 4.
3. Qualquer anexo adotado em conformidade com o parágrafo 2 acima deve entrar em vigor para todas as Partes desta Convenção seis meses após a comunicação a essas Partes, pelo Depositário, da adoção do anexo, à exceção das Partes que notificarem o Depositário, por escrito e no mesmo prazo, de sua não-aceitação do anexo. O anexo deve entrar em vigor para as Partes que tenham retirado sua notificação de não-aceitação no nonagésimo dia após o recebimento, pelo Depositário, da retirada dessa notificação.
4. A proposta, adoção e entrada em vigor de emendas aos anexos desta Convenção devem estar sujeitas ao mesmo procedimento obedecido no caso de proposta, adoção e entrada em vigor de anexos desta Convenção, em conformidade com os parágrafos 2 e 3 acima.
5. Se a adoção de um anexo ou de uma emenda a um anexo envolver uma emenda a esta Convenção, esse anexo ou emenda a um anexo somente deve entrar em vigor quando a emenda à Convenção estiver em vigor.

ARTIGO 17

PROTOCOLOS

1. Em qualquer de suas sessões ordinárias, a Conferência das Partes pode adotar protocolos a esta Convenção.
2. O texto de qualquer proposta de protocolo deve ser comunicado às Partes pelo Secretariado pelo menos seis meses antes dessa sessão da Conferência das Partes.
3. As exigências para a entrada em vigor de qualquer protocolo devem ser estabelecidas por esse instrumento.
4. Somente Partes desta Convenção podem ser Partes de um protocolo.
5. As decisões no âmbito de qualquer protocolo devem ser exclusivamente tomadas pelas Partes desse protocolo.



5. De acordo com a aplicação do parágrafo 2 acima, se, doze meses após a notificação de uma Parte por outra de que existe uma controvérsia entre elas, as Partes envolvidas não conseguirem solucionar a controvérsia, recorrendo aos meios a que se refere o parágrafo 1 acima, a controvérsia deve ser submetida à conciliação mediante solicitação de qualquer das Partes na controvérsia.

6. Mediante solicitação de uma das Partes na controvérsia, deve ser criada uma comissão de conciliação, composta por um número igual de membros designados por cada Parte interessada e um presidente escolhido conjuntamente pelos membros designados por cada Parte. A comissão deve emitir decisão recomendatória, que deve ser considerada pelas Partes em boa fé.

7. A Conferência das Partes deve estabelecer, o mais breve possível, procedimentos adicionais em relação à conciliação, em anexo sobre conciliação.

8. As disposições deste Artigo aplicam-se a quaisquer instrumentos jurídicos pertinentes que a Conferência das Partes possa adotar, salvo se de outra maneira disposto nesse instrumento.

ARTIGO 15

EMENDAS À CONVENÇÃO

1. Qualquer Parte pode propor emendas a esta Convenção.

2. As emendas a esta Convenção devem ser adotadas em sessão ordinária da Conferência das Partes. O texto de qualquer emenda proposta a esta Convenção deve ser comunicado às Partes pelo Secretariado pelo menos seis meses antes da sessão na qual será proposta sua adoção. Propostas de emenda devem também ser comunicadas pelo Secretariado aos signatários desta Convenção e ao Depositário, para informação.

3. As Partes devem fazer todo o possível para chegar a acordo por consenso sobre as emendas propostas a esta Convenção. Uma vez exauridos todos os esforços para chegar a um consenso sem que se tenha chegado a um acordo, a emenda deve ser adotada, em última instância, por maioria de três quartos das Partes presentes e votantes nessa sessão. As emendas adotadas devem ser comunicadas pelo Secretariado ao Depositário, que deve comunicá-las a todas as Partes para aceitação.

4. Os instrumentos de aceitação de emendas devem ser depositados junto ao Depositário. As emendas adotadas em conformidade com o parágrafo 3 acima devem entrar em vigor para as Partes que a tenham aceito no nonagésimo dia após o recebimento, pelo Depositário, de instrumentos de aceitação de pelo menos três quartos das Partes desta Convenção.

5. As emendas devem entrar em vigor para qualquer outra Parte no nonagésimo dia após a Parte ter depositado seu instrumento de aceitação das emendas.

6. Para os fins deste Artigo, "Partes presentes e votantes" significa as Partes presentes e que emitam voto afirmativo ou negativo.

10. De acordo com o parágrafo 9 acima, e sem prejuízo da capacidade de qualquer Parte de, a qualquer momento, tornar pública sua comunicação, o Secretariado deve tornar públicas as comunicações feitas pelas Partes em conformidade com este Artigo no momento em que forem submetidas à Conferência das Partes.

ARTIGO 13

SOLUÇÃO DE QUESTÕES RELATIVAS À IMPLEMENTAÇÃO DA CONVENÇÃO

Em sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve considerar o estabelecimento de um mecanismo de consultas multilaterais, ao qual poderão recorrer as Partes mediante solicitação, para a solução de questões relativas à implementação desta Convenção.

ARTIGO 14

SOLUÇÃO DE CONTROVÉRSIAS

1. No caso de controvérsia entre duas ou mais Partes no que respeita à interpretação ou aplicação desta Convenção, as Partes envolvidas devem procurar resolvê-las por meio de negociação ou qualquer outro meio pacífico de sua própria escolha.

2. Ao ratificar, aceitar, ou aprovar esta Convenção ou a ela aderir, ou em qualquer momento posterior, qualquer Parte que não seja uma organização de integração econômica regional pode declarar, por escrito ao Depositário, que reconhece como compulsório *ipso facto*, e sem acordo especial, com respeito a qualquer controvérsia relativa à interpretação ou aplicação desta Convenção e em relação a qualquer Parte que aceite a mesma obrigação:

- a) Submissão da controvérsia à Corte Internacional de Justiça e/ou
- b) Arbitragem, de acordo com os procedimentos a serem estabelecidos pela Conferência das Partes, o mais breve possível, em anexo sobre arbitragem.

Uma Parte que seja uma organização de integração econômica regional pode fazer uma declaração com efeito similar em relação à arbitragem em conformidade com os procedimentos mencionados na alínea (b) acima.

3. Toda declaração feita de acordo com o parágrafo 2 acima permanecerá em vigor até a data de expiração nela prevista ou, no máximo, durante três meses após o depósito, junto ao Depositário, de um aviso por escrito de sua revogação.

4. Toda nova declaração, todo aviso de revogação ou a expiração da declaração não devem afetar, de forma alguma, processos pendentes na Corte Internacional de Justiça ou no tribunal de arbitragem, a menos que as Partes na controvérsia concordem de outra maneira.

3. Ademais, cada Parte país desenvolvido e cada uma das demais Partes desenvolvidas citadas no Anexo II deve incluir pormenores de medidas tomadas em conformidade com o Artigo 4, parágrafos 3, 4 e 5.

4. As Partes países em desenvolvimento podem, voluntariamente, propor projetos para financiamento, inclusive especificando tecnologias, materiais, equipamentos, técnicas ou práticas necessários à execução desses projetos, juntamente, se possível, com estimativa de todos os custos adicionais, de reduções de emissões e aumento de remoções de gases de efeito estufa, bem como estimativas dos benefícios resultantes.

5. Cada Parte país desenvolvido e cada uma das demais Partes incluídas no Anexo I deve apresentar sua comunicação inicial dentro de seis meses da entrada em vigor desta Convenção para essa Parte. Cada Parte não incluída deve apresentar sua comunicação inicial dentro de três anos da entrada em vigor desta Convenção para essa Parte ou a partir da disponibilidade de recursos financeiros de acordo com o Artigo 4, parágrafo 3. As Partes que forem países de menor desenvolvimento relativo podem apresentar sua comunicação inicial quando o desejarem. A frequência das comunicações subseqüentes de todas as Partes deve ser determinada pela Conferência das Partes, levando em conta o cronograma diferenciado previsto neste parágrafo.

6. As informações relativas a este Artigo apresentadas pelas Partes devem ser transmitidas pelo Secretariado, tão logo possível, à Conferência das Partes e a quaisquer órgãos subsidiários interessados. Se necessário, a Conferência das Partes pode reexaminar os procedimentos para a transmissão de informações.

7. A partir de sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve tomar providências, mediante solicitação, no sentido de apoiar técnica e financeiramente as Partes países em desenvolvimento na compilação e apresentação de informações relativas a este Artigo, bem como de identificar necessidades técnicas e financeiras relativas a projetos propostos e medidas de resposta previstas no Artigo 4. Esse apoio pode ser concedido por outras Partes, por organizações internacionais competentes e pelo Secretariado, conforme o caso.

8. Qualquer grupo de Partes pode, sujeito às diretrizes adotadas pela Conferência das Partes e mediante notificação prévia à Conferência das Partes, apresentar comunicação conjunta no cumprimento de suas obrigações assumidas sob este Artigo, desde que essa comunicação inclua informações sobre o cumprimento, por cada uma dessas Partes, de suas obrigações individuais no âmbito desta Convenção.

9. As informações recebidas pelo Secretariado, que sejam classificadas como confidenciais por uma Parte, em conformidade com critérios a serem estabelecidos pela Conferência das Partes, devem ser compiladas pelo Secretariado de modo a proteger seu caráter confidencial antes de serem colocadas à disposição de quaisquer dos órgãos envolvidos na transmissão e no exame de informações.

- c) Apresentação à Conferência das Partes de relatórios periódicos da entidade ou entidades sobre suas operações de financiamento, de forma compatível com a exigência de prestação de contas prevista no parágrafo 1 deste Artigo; e
- d) Determinação, de maneira previsível e identificável, do valor dos financiamentos necessários e disponíveis para a implementação desta Convenção e das condições sob as quais esse valor deve ser periodicamente reexaminado.

4. Em sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve definir os meios para implementar as disposições precedentes, reexaminando e levando em conta os dispositivos provisórios mencionados no Artigo 21, parágrafo 3, e deve decidir se esses dispositivos provisórios devem ser mantidos. Subseqüentemente, dentro de quatro anos, a Conferência das Partes deve reexaminar o mecanismo financeiro e tomar medidas adequadas.

5. As Partes países desenvolvidos podem também prover recursos financeiros relacionados com a implementação desta Convenção mediante canais bilaterais, regionais e multilaterais e as Partes países em desenvolvimento podem deles beneficiar-se.

ARTIGO 12

TRANSMISSÃO DE INFORMAÇÕES RELATIVAS À IMPLEMENTAÇÃO

1. Em conformidade com o Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, cada Parte deve transmitir à Conferência das Partes, por meio do Secretariado, as seguintes informações:

- a) Inventário nacional de emissões antrópicas por fontes e de remoções por sumidouros de todos os gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, dentro de suas possibilidades, usando metodologias comparáveis desenvolvidas e aprovadas pela Conferência das Partes;
- b) Descrição geral das medidas tomadas ou previstas pela Parte para implementar esta Convenção; e
- c) Qualquer outra informação que a Parte considere relevante para a realização do objetivo desta Convenção e apta a ser incluída em sua comunicação, inclusive, se possível, dados pertinentes para cálculos das tendências das emissões mundiais.

2. Cada Parte país desenvolvido e cada uma das demais Partes citadas no Anexo I deve incluir as seguintes informações em sua comunicação:

- a) Descrição pormenorizada das políticas e medidas por ela adotadas para implementar suas obrigações assumidas sob o Artigo 4, parágrafo 2, alíneas (a) e (b); e
- b) Estimativa específica dos efeitos que as políticas e medidas mencionadas na alínea (a) acima terão sobre as emissões antrópicas por fontes e remoções por sumidouros de



ÓRGÃO SUBSIDIÁRIO DE IMPLEMENTAÇÃO

1. Fica estabelecido um órgão subsidiário de implementação para auxiliar a Conferência das Partes na avaliação e exame do cumprimento efetivo desta Convenção. Esse órgão deve estar aberto à participação de todas as Partes, e deve ser composto por representantes governamentais especializados em questões relativas à mudança do clima. Deve apresentar regularmente relatórios à Conferência das Partes sobre todos os aspectos de seu trabalho.

2. Sob a orientação da Conferência das Partes, esse órgão deve:

- a) Examinar as informações transmitidas em conformidade com o Artigo 12, parágrafo 1, no sentido de avaliar o efeito agregado geral das medidas tomadas pelas Partes à luz das avaliações científicas mais recentes sobre a mudança do clima;
- b) Examinar as informações transmitidas em conformidade com o Artigo 12, parágrafo 2, no sentido de auxiliar a Conferência das Partes a realizar os exames requeridos no Artigo 4, parágrafo 2, alínea (d); e
- c) Auxiliar a Conferência das Partes, conforme o caso, na preparação e implementação de suas decisões.

ARTIGO 11

MECANISMO FINANCEIRO

1. Fica definido um mecanismo para a provisão de recursos financeiros a título de doação ou em base concessional, inclusive para fins de transferência de tecnologia. Esse mecanismo deve funcionar sob a orientação da Conferência das Partes e prestar contas à mesma, a qual deve decidir sobre suas políticas, prioridades programáticas e critérios de aceitabilidade relativos a esta Convenção. Seu funcionamento deve ser confiado a uma ou mais entidades internacionais existentes.

2. O mecanismo financeiro deve ter uma representação equitativa e equilibrada de todas as Partes, num sistema transparente de administração.

3. A Conferência das Partes e a entidade ou entidades encarregadas do funcionamento do mecanismo financeiro devem aprovar os meios para operar os parágrafos precedentes, que devem incluir o seguinte:

- a) Modalidades para garantir que os projetos financiados para enfrentar a mudança do clima estejam de acordo com as políticas, prioridades programáticas e critérios de aceitabilidade estabelecidos pela Conferência das Partes;
- b) Modalidades pelas quais uma determinada decisão de financiamento possa ser reconsiderada à luz dessas políticas, prioridades programáticas e critérios de aceitabilidade;

- f) Estabelecer, sob a orientação geral da Conferência das Partes, mecanismos administrativos e contratuais necessários ao desempenho eficaz de suas funções; e
 - g) Desempenhar as demais funções de secretariado definidas nesta Convenção e em quaisquer de seus protocolos e todas as demais funções definidas pela Conferência das Partes.
3. Em sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve designar um Secretariado permanente e tomar as providências para seu funcionamento.

ARTIGO 9

ÓRGÃO SUBSIDIÁRIO DE ASSESSORAMENTO CIENTÍFICO E TECNOLÓGICO

1. Fica estabelecido um órgão subsidiário de assessoramento científico e tecnológico para prestar, em tempo oportuno, à Conferência das Partes e, conforme o caso, a seus órgãos subsidiários, informações e assessoramento sobre assuntos científicos e tecnológicos relativos a esta Convenção. Esse órgão deve estar aberto à participação de todas as Partes e deve ser multidisciplinar. Deve ser composto por representantes governamentais com competência nos campos de especialização pertinentes. Deve apresentar relatórios regularmente à Conferência das Partes sobre todos os aspectos de seu trabalho.
2. Sob a orientação da Conferência das Partes e recorrendo a organismos internacionais competentes existentes, este órgão deve:
- a) Apresentar avaliações do estado do conhecimento científico relativo à mudança do clima e a seus efeitos;
 - b) Preparar avaliações científicas dos efeitos de medidas adotadas na implementação desta Convenção;
 - c) Identificar tecnologias e conhecimentos técnicos inovadores, eficientes e mais avançados, bem como prestar assessoramento sobre as formas e meios de promover o desenvolvimento e/ou a transferência dessas tecnologias;
 - d) Prestar assessoramento sobre programas científicos e cooperação internacional em pesquisa e desenvolvimento, relativos à mudança do clima, bem como sobre formas e meios de apoiar a capacitação endógena em países em desenvolvimento; e
 - e) Responder a questões científicas, tecnológicas e metodológicas que lhe formulem a Conferência das Partes e seus órgãos subsidiários.
3. As funções e o mandato deste órgão podem ser posteriormente melhor definidos pela Conferência das Partes.

ARTIGO 10



nesta Convenção. Esses procedimentos poderão especificar maiorias necessárias à adoção de certas decisões.

4. A primeira sessão da Conferência das Partes deve ser convocada pelo Secretariado interino mencionado no Artigo 21, e deverá realizar-se no mais tardar dentro de um ano da entrada em vigor desta Convenção. Subseqüentemente, sessões ordinárias da Conferência das Partes devem ser realizadas anualmente, a menos que de outra forma decidido pela Conferência das Partes.

5. Sessões extraordinárias da Conferência das Partes devem ser realizadas quando for considerado pela Conferência, ou por solicitação escrita de qualquer Parte, desde que, dentro de seis meses após a solicitação ter sido comunicada às Partes pelo Secretariado, seja apoiada por pelo menos um terço das Partes.

6. As Nações Unidas, seus organismos especializados e a Agência Internacional de Energia Atômica, bem como qualquer Estado-Membro ou observador junto às mesmas que não seja Parte desta Convenção podem se fazer representar como observadores nas sessões da Conferência das Partes. Qualquer outro órgão ou organismo, nacional ou internacional, governamental ou não-governamental, competente em assuntos abrangidos por esta Convenção, que informe ao Secretariado do seu desejo de se fazer representar como observador numa sessão da Conferência das Partes, pode ser admitido, a menos que um terço das partes apresente objeção. A admissão e participação de observadores deve sujeitar-se às regras de procedimento adotadas pela Conferência das Partes.

ARTIGO 8

SECRETARIADO

1. Fica estabelecido um Secretariado.

2. As funções do Secretariado são:

- a) Organizar as sessões da Conferência das Partes e dos órgãos subsidiários estabelecidos por esta Convenção, e prestar-lhes os serviços necessários;
- b) Reunir e transmitir os relatórios a ele apresentados;
- c) Prestar assistência às Partes, em particular às Partes países em desenvolvimento, mediante solicitação, na compilação e transmissão de informações necessárias em conformidade com as disposições desta Convenção;
- d) Elaborar relatórios sobre suas atividades e apresentá-los à Conferência das Partes;
- e) Garantir a necessária coordenação com os secretariados de outros organismos internacionais pertinentes;

diferentes circunstâncias, responsabilidades e capacidades das Partes e suas respectivas obrigações assumidas sob esta Convenção;

- c) Facilitar, mediante solicitação de duas ou mais Partes, a coordenação de medidas por elas adotadas para enfrentar a mudança do clima e seus efeitos, levando em conta as diferentes circunstâncias, responsabilidades e capacidades das Partes e suas respectivas obrigações assumidas sob esta Convenção;
- d) Promover e orientar, de acordo com os objetivos e disposições desta Convenção, o desenvolvimento e aperfeiçoamento periódico de metodologias comparáveis, a serem definidas pela Conferência das Partes para, entre outras coisas, elaborar inventários de emissões de gases de efeito estufa por fontes e de remoções por sumidouros e avaliar a eficácia de medidas para limitar as emissões e aumentar as remoções desse gases;
- e) Avaliar, com base em todas as informações tornadas disponíveis em conformidade com as disposições desta Convenção, sua implementação pelas Partes; os efeitos gerais das medidas adotadas em conformidade com esta Convenção, em particular os efeitos ambientais, econômicos e sociais; assim como seus impactos cumulativos e o grau de avanço alcançado na consecução do objetivo desta Convenção;
- f) Examinar e adotar relatórios periódicos sobre a implementação desta Convenção, e garantir sua publicação;
- g) Fazer recomendações sobre quaisquer assuntos necessários à implementação desta Convenção;
- h) Procurar mobilizar recursos financeiros em conformidade com o Artigo 4, parágrafos 3, 4 e 5 e com o Artigo 11;
- i) Estabelecer os órgãos subsidiários considerados necessários à implementação desta Convenção;
- j) Examinar relatórios apresentados por seus órgãos subsidiários e dar-lhes orientação;
- k) Definir e adotar, por consenso, suas regras de procedimento e regulamento financeiro, bem como os de seus órgãos subsidiários;
- l) Solicitar e utilizar, conforme o caso, os serviços e a cooperação de organizações internacionais e de organismos intergovernamentais e não governamentais competentes, bem como as informações por elas fornecidas; e
- m) Desempenhar as demais funções necessárias à consecução do objetivo desta Convenção, bem como todas as demais funções a ela atribuídas por esta Convenção.

3. Em sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve adotar suas regras de procedimento e as dos órgãos subsidiários estabelecidos por esta Convenção, que devem incluir procedimentos para a tomada de decisão em assuntos não abrangidos pelos procedimentos decisórios previstos



EDUCAÇÃO, TREINAMENTO E CONSCIENTIZAÇÃO PÚBLICA

Ao cumprirem suas obrigações previstas no Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, alínea (i), as Partes devem:

- a) Promover e facilitar, em níveis nacional e, conforme o caso, subregional e regional, em conformidade com sua legislação e regulamentos nacionais e conforme suas respectivas capacidades:
 - i) a elaboração e a execução de programas educacionais e de conscientização pública sobre a mudança do clima e seus efeitos;
 - ii) o acesso público a informações sobre a mudança do clima e seus efeitos;
 - iii) a participação pública no tratamento da mudança do clima e de seus efeitos e na concepção de medidas de resposta adequadas; e
 - iv) o treinamento de pessoal científico, técnico e de direção.
- b) Cooperar, em nível internacional e, conforme o caso, por meio de organismos existentes, nas seguintes atividades, e promovê-las:
 - i) a elaboração e o intercâmbio de materiais educacionais e de conscientização pública sobre a mudança do clima e seus efeitos; e
 - ii) a elaboração e a execução de programas educacionais e de treinamento, inclusive o fortalecimento de instituições nacionais e o intercâmbio ou recrutamento de pessoal para treinar especialistas nessa área, em particular para os países em desenvolvimento.

ARTIGO 7

CONFERÊNCIA DAS PARTES

1. Uma Conferência das Partes é estabelecida por esta Convenção.
2. Como órgão supremo desta Convenção, a Conferência das Partes manterá regularmente sob exame a implementação desta Convenção e de quaisquer de seus instrumentos jurídicos que a Conferência das Partes possa adotar, além de tomar, conforme seu mandato, as decisões necessárias para promover a efetiva implementação desta Convenção. Para tal fim, deve:
 - a) Examinar periodicamente as obrigações das Partes e os mecanismos institucionais estabelecidos por esta Convenção à luz de seus objetivos, da experiência adquirida em sua implementação e da evolução dos conhecimentos científicos e tecnológicos;
 - b) Promover e facilitar o intercâmbio de informações sobre medidas adotadas pelas Partes para enfrentar a mudança do clima e seus efeitos, levando em conta as

- g) nos países com regiões de ecossistemas frágeis, inclusive ecossistemas montanhosos;
- h) nos países cujas economias dependem fortemente da renda gerada pela produção, processamento, exportação e/ou consumo de combustíveis fósseis e de produtos afins com elevado coeficiente energético; e
- i) nos países mediterrâneos e países de trânsito.

Ademais, a Conferência das Partes pode adotar as medidas, conforme o caso, no que se refere a este parágrafo.

9. As Partes devem levar plenamente em conta as necessidades específicas e a situação especial dos países de menor desenvolvimento relativo em suas medidas relativas a financiamentos e transferência de tecnologia.

10. Em conformidade com o Artigo 10, as Partes devem levar em conta, no cumprimento das obrigações assumidas sob esta Convenção, a situação das Partes países em desenvolvimento, cujas economias sejam vulneráveis aos efeitos negativos das medidas de resposta à mudança do clima. Isto aplica-se em especial às Partes cujas economias sejam altamente dependentes da renda gerada pela produção, processamento, exportação e/ou do consumo de combustíveis fósseis e de produtos afins com elevado coeficiente energético e/ou da utilização de combustíveis fósseis cuja substituição lhes acarrete sérias dificuldades.

ARTIGO 5

PESQUISA E OBSERVAÇÃO SISTEMÁTICA

Ao cumprirem as obrigações previstas no Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, alínea (g), as partes devem:

- a) Apoiar e promover o desenvolvimento adicional, conforme o caso, de programas e redes ou organizações internacionais e intergovernamentais que visem a definir, conduzir, avaliar e financiar pesquisas, coletas de dados e observação sistemática, levando em conta a necessidade de minimizar a duplicação de esforços;
- b) Apoiar os esforços internacionais e intergovernamentais para fortalecer a observação sistemática, as capacidades e recursos nacionais de pesquisa científica e técnica, particularmente nos países em desenvolvimento, e promover o acesso e o intercâmbio de dados e análises obtidas em áreas além dos limites da jurisdição nacional; e
- c) Levar em conta as preocupações e necessidades particulares dos países em desenvolvimento e cooperar no aperfeiçoamento de suas capacidades e recursos endógenos para que eles possam participar dos esforços a que se referem as alíneas (a) e (b) acima.

ARTIGO 6

4. As Partes países desenvolvidos e demais Partes desenvolvidas incluídas no Anexo II devem também auxiliar as Partes países em desenvolvimento, particularmente vulneráveis aos efeitos negativos da mudança do clima, a cobrirem os custos de sua adaptação a esses efeitos negativos.

5. As Partes países desenvolvidos e outras Partes desenvolvidas incluídas no Anexo II devem adotar todas as medidas possíveis para promover, facilitar e financiar, conforme o caso, a transferência de tecnologias e de conhecimentos técnicos ambientalmente saudáveis, ou o acesso aos mesmos, a outras Partes, particularmente às Partes países em desenvolvimento, a fim de capacitá-las a implementar as disposições desta Convenção. Nesse processo, as Partes países desenvolvidos devem apoiar o desenvolvimento e a melhoria das capacidades e tecnologias endógenas das Partes países em desenvolvimento. Outras Partes e organizações que estejam em condições de fazê-lo podem também auxiliar a facilitar a transferência dessas tecnologias.

6. No cumprimento de seus compromissos previstos no parágrafo 2 acima, a Conferência das Partes concederá certa flexibilidade às Partes em processo de transição para uma economia de mercado incluídas no Anexo I, a fim de aumentar a capacidade dessas Partes de enfrentar a mudança do clima, inclusive no que se refere ao nível histórico, tomado como referência, de emissões antrópicas de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal.

7. O grau de efetivo cumprimento dos compromissos assumidos sob esta Convenção das Partes países em desenvolvimento dependerá do cumprimento efetivo dos compromissos assumidos sob esta Convenção pelas Partes países desenvolvidos, no que se refere a recursos financeiros e transferência de tecnologia, e levará plenamente em conta o fato de que o desenvolvimento econômico e social e a erradicação da pobreza são as prioridades primordiais e absolutas das Partes países em desenvolvimento.

8. No cumprimento dos compromissos previstos neste Artigo, as Partes devem examinar plenamente que medidas são necessárias tomar sob esta Convenção, inclusive medidas relacionadas a financiamento, seguro e transferência de tecnologias, para atender as necessidades e preocupações específicas das Partes países em desenvolvimento resultantes dos efeitos negativos da mudança do clima e/ou do impacto da implementação de medidas de resposta, em especial:

- a) nos pequenos países insulares;
- b) nos países com zonas costeiras de baixa altitude;
- c) nos países com regiões áridas e semi-áridas, áreas de florestas e áreas sujeitas à degradação de florestas;
- d) nos países com regiões propensas a desastres naturais;
- e) nos países com regiões sujeitas à seca e desertificação;
- f) nos países com regiões de alta poluição atmosférica urbana;

periodicamente a partir de então, a Conferência das Partes deve examinar e definir metodologias a serem empregadas nesses cálculos;

- d) Em sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve examinar a adequação das alíneas (a) e (b) acima. Esse exame deve ser feito à luz das melhores informações e avaliações científicas disponíveis sobre a mudança do clima e seus efeitos, bem como de informações técnicas, sociais e econômicas pertinentes. Com base nesse exame, a Conferência das Partes deve adotar medidas adequadas, que podem contemplar a adoção de emendas aos compromissos previstos nas alíneas (a) e (b) acima. Em sua primeira sessão, a Conferência das Partes deve também adotar decisões sobre critérios para implementação conjunta indicada na alínea (a) acima. Um segundo exame das alíneas (a) e (b) deve ser feito no mais tardar até 31 de dezembro de 1998 e posteriormente em intervalos regulares determinados pela Conferência das Partes, até que o objetivo desta Convenção seja alcançado;
- e) Cada uma dessas Partes deve:
 - i) coordenar-se, conforme o caso, com as demais Partes indicadas a respeito de instrumentos econômicos e administrativos pertinentes visando a alcançar o objetivo desta Convenção; e
 - ii) identificar e examinar periodicamente suas próprias políticas e práticas que possam estimular atividades que levem a níveis de emissões antrópicas de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal mais elevados do que normalmente ocorreriam;
- f) A Conferência das Partes deve examinar, no mais tardar até 31 dezembro de 1998, informações disponíveis com vistas a adoção de decisões, caso necessário, sobre as emendas às listas dos Anexos I e II, com a aprovação da Parte interessada;
- g) Qualquer Parte não incluída no Anexo I pode, em seu instrumento de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão, ou posteriormente, notificar o Depositário de sua intenção de assumir as obrigações previstas nas alíneas (a) e (b) acima. O Depositário deve informar os demais signatários e Partes de tais notificações.

3. As Partes países desenvolvidos e demais Partes desenvolvidas incluídas no Anexo II devem prover recursos financeiros novos e adicionais para cobrir integralmente os custos por elas concordados incorridos por Partes países em desenvolvimento no cumprimento de suas obrigações previstas no Artigo 12, parágrafo 1. Também devem prover os recursos financeiros, inclusive para fins de transferência de tecnologias, de que necessitam as Partes países em desenvolvimento para cobrir integralmente os custos adicionais por elas concordados decorrentes da implementação de medidas previstas no parágrafo 1 deste Artigo e que sejam concordados entre uma Parte país em desenvolvimento e a entidade ou entidades internacionais a que se refere o Artigo 11, em conformidade com esse Artigo. Para o cumprimento desses compromissos deve ser levada em conta a necessidade de que o fluxo de recursos seja adequado e previsível e a importância de distribuir os custos entre as Partes países desenvolvidos.

- i) Promover e cooperar na educação, treinamento e conscientização pública em relação à mudança do clima, e estimular a mais ampla participação nesse processo, inclusive a participação de organizações não governamentais; e
- j) Transmitir à Conferência das Partes informações relativas à implementação, em conformidade com o Artigo 12.

2. As Partes países desenvolvidos e demais Partes constantes do Anexo I se comprometem especificamente com o seguinte:

- a) Cada uma dessas Partes deve adotar políticas nacionais ^{1/} e medidas correspondentes para mitigar a mudança do clima, limitando suas emissões antrópicas de gases de efeito estufa e protegendo e aumentando seus sumidouros e reservatórios de gases de efeito estufa. Essas políticas e medidas demonstrarão que os países desenvolvidos estão tomando a iniciativa no que se refere a modificar as tendências de mais longo prazo das emissões antrópicas em conformidade com o objetivo desta Convenção, reconhecendo que contribuiria para tal modificação a volta, até o final da presente década, a níveis anteriores das emissões antrópicas de dióxido de carbono e de outros gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal; e levando em conta as diferentes situações iniciais e enfoques, estruturas econômicas e fontes de recursos dessas Partes, a necessidade de manter um crescimento econômico vigoroso e sustentável, as tecnologias disponíveis e outras circunstâncias individuais, bem como a necessidade de que cada uma dessas Partes contribua equitativa e adequadamente ao esforço mundial voltado para esse objetivo. Essas Partes podem implementar tais políticas e medidas juntamente com outras Partes e podem auxiliar essas outras Partes a contribuírem para que se alcance o objetivo desta Convenção e, particularmente, desta alínea;
- b) A fim de promover avanço nesse sentido, cada uma dessas Partes deve apresentar, em conformidade com o Artigo 12, dentro de seis meses da entrada em vigor para si desta Convenção, e periodicamente a partir de então, informações pormenorizadas sobre as políticas e medidas a que se refere a alínea (a) acima, bem como sobre a projeção de suas emissões antrópicas residuais por fontes e de remoções por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal no período a que se refere a alínea (a) acima, com a finalidade de que essas emissões antrópicas de dióxido de carbono e de outros gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal voltem, individual ou conjuntamente, a seus níveis de 1990. Essas informações serão examinadas pela Conferência das Partes em sua primeira sessão e periodicamente a partir de então, em conformidade com o Artigo 7;
- c) Os cálculos de emissões por fontes e de remoções por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa para os fins da alínea (b) acima devem levar em conta o melhor conhecimento científico disponível, inclusive o da efetiva capacidade dos sumidouros e as respectivas contribuições de tais gases para a mudança do clima. Em sua primeira sessão e

estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, empregando metodologias comparáveis a serem acordadas pela Conferência das Partes;

- b) Formular, implementar, publicar e atualizar regularmente programas nacionais e, conforme o caso, regionais, que incluam medidas para mitigar a mudança do clima, enfrentando as emissões antrópicas por fontes e remoções por sumidouros de todos os gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, bem como medidas para permitir adaptação adequada à mudança do clima;
- c) Promover e cooperar para o desenvolvimento, aplicação e difusão, inclusive transferência, de tecnologias, práticas e processos que controlem, reduzam ou previnam as emissões antrópicas de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal em todos os setores pertinentes, inclusive nos setores de energia, transportes, indústria, agricultura, silvicultura e administração de resíduos;
- d) Promover a gestão sustentável, bem como promover e cooperar na conservação e fortalecimento, conforme o caso, de sumidouros e reservatórios de todos os gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, incluindo a biomassa, as florestas e os oceanos como também outros ecossistemas terrestres, costeiros e marinhos;
- e) Cooperar nos preparativos para a adaptação aos impactos da mudança do clima; desenvolver e elaborar planos adequados e integrados para a gestão de zonas costeiras, recursos hídricos e agricultura, e para a proteção e recuperação de regiões, particularmente na África, afetadas pela seca e desertificação, bem como por inundações;
- f) Levar em conta, na medida do possível, os fatores relacionados com a mudança do clima em suas políticas e medidas sociais, econômicas e ambientais pertinentes, bem como empregar métodos adequados, tais como avaliações de impactos, formulados e definidos nacionalmente, com vistas a minimizar os efeitos negativos na economia, na saúde pública e na qualidade do meio ambiente, provocados por projetos ou medidas aplicadas pelas Partes para mitigarem a mudança do clima ou a ela se adaptarem;
- g) Promover e cooperar em pesquisas científicas, tecnológicas, técnicas, socioeconômicas e outras, em observações sistemáticas e no desenvolvimento de bancos de dados relativos ao sistema climático, cuja finalidade seja esclarecer e reduzir ou eliminar as incertezas ainda existentes em relação às causas, efeitos, magnitude e evolução no tempo da mudança do clima e as conseqüências econômicas e sociais de diversas estratégias de resposta;
- h) Promover e cooperar no intercâmbio pleno, aberto e imediato de informações científicas, tecnológicas, técnicas, socioeconômicas e jurídicas relativas ao sistema climático e à mudança do clima, bem como às conseqüências econômicas e sociais de diversas estratégias de resposta;



mas diferenciadas e respectivas capacidades. Em decorrência, as Partes países desenvolvidos devem tomar a iniciativa no combate à mudança do clima e a seus efeitos.

2. Devem ser levadas em plena consideração as necessidades específicas e circunstâncias especiais das Partes países em desenvolvimento, em especial aqueles particularmente mais vulneráveis aos efeitos negativos da mudança do clima, e das Partes, em especial Partes países em desenvolvimento, que tenham que assumir encargos desproporcionais e anormais sob esta Convenção.

3. As Partes devem adotar medidas de precaução para prever, evitar ou minimizar as causas da mudança do clima e mitigar seus efeitos negativos. Quando surgirem ameaças de danos sérios ou irreversíveis, a falta de plena certeza científica não deve ser usada como razão para postergar essas medidas, levando em conta que as políticas e medidas adotadas para enfrentar a mudança do clima devem ser eficazes em função dos custos, de modo a assegurar benefícios mundiais ao menor custo possível. Para esse fim, essas políticas e medidas devem levar em conta os diferentes contextos socioeconômicos, ser abrangentes, cobrir todas as fontes, sumidouros e reservatórios significativos de gases de efeito estufa e adaptações, e abranger todos os setores econômicos. As Partes interessadas podem realizar esforços, em cooperação, para enfrentar a mudança do clima.

4. As Partes têm o direito ao desenvolvimento sustentável e devem promovê-lo. As políticas e medidas para proteger o sistema climático contra mudanças induzidas pelo homem devem ser adequadas às condições específicas de cada Parte e devem ser integradas aos programas nacionais de desenvolvimento, levando em conta que o desenvolvimento econômico é essencial à adoção de medidas para enfrentar a mudança do clima.

5. As Partes devem cooperar para promover um sistema econômico internacional favorável e aberto conducente ao crescimento e ao desenvolvimento econômico sustentáveis de todas as Partes, em especial das Partes países em desenvolvimento, possibilitando-lhes, assim, melhor enfrentar os problemas da mudança do clima. As medidas adotadas para combater a mudança do clima, inclusive as unilaterais, não devem constituir meio de discriminação arbitrária ou injustificável ou restrição velada ao comércio internacional.

ARTIGO 4

OBRIGAÇÕES

1. Todas as Partes, levando em conta suas responsabilidades comuns mas diferenciadas e suas prioridades de desenvolvimento, objetivos e circunstâncias específicos, nacionais e regionais, devem:

- a) Elaborar, atualizar periodicamente, publicar e por à disposição da Conferência das Partes, em conformidade com o Artigo 12, inventários nacionais de emissões antrópicas por fontes e das remoções por sumidouros de todos os gases de efeito

3. “Sistema climático” significa a totalidade da atmosfera, hidrosfera, biosfera e geosfera e suas interações.
4. “Emissões” significa a liberação de gases de efeito estufa e/ou seus precursores na atmosfera numa área específica e num período determinado.
5. “Gases de efeito estufa” significa os constituintes gasosos da atmosfera, naturais e antrópicos, que absorvem e reemitem radiação infravermelha.
6. “Organização regional de integração econômica” significa uma organização constituída de Estados soberanos de uma determinada região que tem competência em relação a assuntos regidos por esta Convenção ou seus protocolos, e que foi devidamente autorizada, em conformidade com seus procedimentos internos, a assinar, ratificar, aceitar, aprovar os mesmos ou a eles aderir.
7. “Reservatórios” significa um componente ou componentes do sistema climático no qual fica armazenado um gás de efeito estufa ou um precursor de um gás de efeito estufa.
8. “Sumidouro” significa qualquer processo, atividade ou mecanismo que remova um gás de efeito estufa, um aerossol ou um precursor de um gás de efeito estufa da atmosfera.
9. “Fonte” significa qualquer processo ou atividade que libere um gás de efeito estufa, um aerossol ou um precursor de gás de efeito estufa na atmosfera.

ARTIGO 2

OBJETIVO

O objetivo final desta Convenção e de quaisquer instrumentos jurídicos com ela relacionados que adote a Conferência das Partes é o de alcançar, em conformidade com as disposições pertinentes desta Convenção, a estabilização das concentrações de gases de efeito estufa na atmosfera num nível que impeça uma interferência antrópica perigosa no sistema climático. Esse nível deverá ser alcançado num prazo suficiente que permita aos ecossistemas adaptarem-se naturalmente à mudança do clima, que assegure que a produção de alimentos não seja ameaçada e que permita ao desenvolvimento econômico prosseguir de maneira sustentável.

ARTIGO 3

PRINCÍPIOS

Em suas ações para alcançar o objetivo desta Convenção e implementar suas disposições, as Partes devem orientar-se, *inter alia*, pelo seguinte:

1. As Partes devem proteger o sistema climático em benefício das gerações presentes e futuras da humanidade com base na equidade e em conformidade com suas responsabilidades comuns



Reconhecendo ainda que países de baixa altitude e outros pequenos países insulares, os países com zonas costeiras de baixa altitude, regiões áridas e semi-áridas ou regiões sujeitas a inundações, seca e desertificação, bem como os países em desenvolvimento com ecossistemas montanhosos frágeis são particularmente vulneráveis aos efeitos negativos da mudança do clima,

Reconhecendo as dificuldades especiais desses países, especialmente os países em desenvolvimento, cujas economias são particularmente dependentes da produção, utilização e exportação de combustíveis fósseis, decorrentes de medidas para a limitação de emissões de gases de efeito estufa,

Afirmado que as medidas para enfrentar a mudança do clima devem ser coordenadas, de forma integrada, com o desenvolvimento social e econômico, de maneira a evitar efeitos negativos neste último, levando plenamente em conta as legítimas necessidades prioritárias dos países em desenvolvimento para alcançar um crescimento econômico sustentável e erradicar a pobreza,

Reconhecendo que todos os países, especialmente os países em desenvolvimento, precisam ter acesso aos recursos necessários para alcançar um desenvolvimento social e econômico sustentável e que, para que os países em desenvolvimento prossigam em direção a essa meta, seus consumos de energia necessitarão aumentar, levando em conta as possibilidades de alcançar maior eficiência energética e de controlar as emissões de gases de efeito estufa em geral, inclusive mediante a aplicação de novas tecnologias em condições que tornem essa aplicação econômica e socialmente benéfica,

Determinadas a proteger o sistema climático para gerações presentes e futuras,

Convieram no seguinte:

ARTIGO 1

DEFINIÇÕES*

Para os propósitos desta Convenção:

1. “Efeitos negativos da mudança do clima” significa as mudanças no meio ambiente físico ou biota resultantes da mudança do clima que tenham efeitos deletérios significativos sobre a composição, resiliência ou produtividade de ecossistemas naturais e administrados, sobre o funcionamento de sistemas socioeconômicos ou sobre a saúde e o bem-estar humanos.
2. “Mudança do clima” significa uma mudança de clima que possa ser direta ou indiretamente atribuída à atividade humana que altere a composição da atmosfera mundial e que se some àquela provocada pela variabilidade climática natural observada ao longo de períodos comparáveis.

Reconhecendo que os Estados devem elaborar legislação ambiental eficaz, que as normas ambientais, objetivos administrativos e prioridades devem refletir o contexto ambiental e de desenvolvimento aos quais se aplicam e que as normas aplicadas por alguns países podem ser inadequadas e implicar custos econômicos e sociais injustificados para outros países, particularmente para os países em desenvolvimento,

Lembrando os dispositivos da resolução 44/228 da Assembleia Geral, de 22 de dezembro de 1989, sobre a Conferência das Nações Unidas Sobre Meio Ambiente e Desenvolvimento, e as resoluções 43/53 de 6 de dezembro de 1988, 44/207 de 22 de dezembro de 1989, 45/212 de 21 de dezembro de 1990 e 46/169 de 19 de dezembro de 1991 sobre a proteção do clima mundial para as gerações presentes e futuras da humanidade,

Lembrando também as disposições da resolução 44/206 da Assembleia Geral, de 22 de dezembro de 1989, sobre os possíveis efeitos negativos da elevação do nível do mar sobre ilhas e zonas costeiras, especialmente zonas costeiras de baixa altitude, e as disposições pertinentes da resolução 44/172 da Assembleia Geral, de 19 de dezembro de 1989, sobre a execução do Plano de Ação de Combate à Desertificação,

Lembrando ainda a Convenção de Viena sobre a Proteção da Camada de Ozônio, de 1985, e o Protocolo de Montreal sobre Substâncias que Destroem a Camada de Ozônio, de 1987, conforme ajustado e emendado em 29 de junho de 1990,

Tomando nota da Declaração Ministerial da Segunda Conferência Mundial sobre o Clima, adotada em 7 de novembro de 1990,

Conscientes do valioso trabalho analítico sobre mudança do clima desenvolvido por muitos Estados, das importantes contribuições da Organização Meteorológica Mundial, do Programa das Nações Unidas para o Meio Ambiente e de outros órgãos, organizações e organismos do sistema das Nações Unidas, bem como de outros organismos internacionais e intergovernamentais, para o intercâmbio de resultados de pesquisas científicas e para a coordenação dessas pesquisas,

Reconhecendo que as medidas necessárias à compreensão e à solução da questão da mudança do clima serão ambiental, social e economicamente mais eficazes se fundamentadas em relevantes considerações científicas, técnicas e econômicas e continuamente reavaliadas à luz de novas descobertas nessas áreas,

Reconhecendo que diversas medidas para enfrentar a mudança do clima são, por natureza, economicamente justificáveis, e também podem ajudar a solucionar outros problemas ambientais,

Reconhecendo também a necessidade de os países desenvolvidos adotarem medidas imediatas, de maneira flexível, com base em prioridades bem definidas, como primeiro passo visando a estratégias de resposta abrangentes em níveis global, nacional e, caso assim concordado, regional que levem em conta todos os gases de efeito estufa, com devida consideração a suas contribuições relativas para o aumento do efeito estufa,



CONVENÇÃO-QUADRO DAS NAÇÕES UNIDAS SOBRE MUDANÇA DO CLIMA

As Partes desta Convenção,

Reconhecendo que a mudança do clima da Terra e seus efeitos negativos são uma preocupação comum da humanidade,

Preocupadas com que atividades humanas estão aumentando substancialmente as concentrações atmosféricas de gases de efeito estufa, com que esse aumento de concentrações está intensificando o efeito estufa natural e com que disso resulte, em média, aquecimento adicional da superfície e da atmosfera da Terra e com que isso possa afetar negativamente os ecossistemas naturais e a humanidade,

Observando que a maior parcela das emissões globais, históricas e atuais, de gases de efeito estufa é originária dos países desenvolvidos, que as emissões per capita dos países em desenvolvimento ainda são relativamente baixas e que a parcela de emissões globais originárias dos países em desenvolvimento crescerá para que eles possam satisfazer suas necessidades sociais e de desenvolvimento,

Cientes do papel e da importância dos sumidouros e reservatórios de gases de efeito estufa nos ecossistemas terrestres e marinhos,

Observando que as previsões relativas à mudança do clima caracterizam-se por muitas incertezas, particularmente no que se refere a sua evolução no tempo, magnitude e padrões regionais,

Reconhecendo que a natureza global da mudança do clima requer a maior cooperação possível de todos os países e sua participação em uma resposta internacional efetiva e apropriada, conforme suas responsabilidades comuns mas diferenciadas e respectivas capacidades e condições sociais e econômicas,

Lembrando as disposições pertinentes da Declaração da Conferência das Nações Unidas sobre o Meio Ambiente Humano, adotada em Estocolmo em 16 de junho de 1972,

Lembrando também que os Estados, em conformidade com a Carta das Nações Unidas e com os princípios do Direito Internacional, têm o direito soberano de explorar seus próprios recursos segundo suas políticas ambientais e de desenvolvimento e a responsabilidade de assegurar que atividades sob sua jurisdição ou controle não causem dano ao meio ambiente de outros Estados ou de áreas além dos limites da jurisdição nacional,

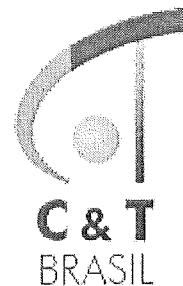
Reafirmando o princípio da soberania dos Estados na cooperação internacional para enfrentar a mudança do clima,

INTRODUÇÃO

Na década de 1980, as evidências científicas relacionando as emissões de gases de efeito estufa provenientes das atividades humanas à mudança do clima global começaram a despertar a preocupação pública. Inspiraram também uma série de conferências internacionais que apelavam para a urgência de um tratado mundial para enfrentar o problema. Em 1990, a Assembléia Geral das Nações Unidas respondeu a esses apelos estabelecendo o Comitê Intergovernamental de Negociação para a Convenção-Quadro sobre Mudança do Clima (INC/FCCE).

O INC/FCCE preparou a redação da Convenção e adotou-a em 9 de maio de 1992 na sede das Nações Unidas em Nova York. A Convenção foi aberta a assinatura em junho de 1992 na Cúpula da Terra no Rio de Janeiro. Foi assinada durante o encontro por Chefes de Estado e outras autoridades de 154 países (e a Comunidade Européia), entrando em vigor em 21 de março de 1994. Até meados de 1997, 165 países ratificaram ou acederam à Convenção, comprometendo-se, assim, com os termos da Convenção.

A Conferência das Partes (COP) – o órgão supremo da Convenção – reuniu-se pela primeira vez no início de 1995 em Berlim. A COP 1 adotou 21 decisões, incluindo o Mandato de Berlim prevendo novas discussões sobre o fortalecimento da Convenção. A COP 2 aconteceu em julho de 1996 nas Nações Unidas em Genebra. A terceira sessão será realizada em dezembro de 1997 em Quioto, Japão. Entre outras medidas, a COP 3 deve adotar um protocolo ou outro instrumento legal contendo compromissos mais fortes para as Partes países desenvolvidos para as primeiras décadas do século XXI.

A alteração global do clima vem sendo debatida bem antes da Convenção Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima em 1992.

Já no final do século XVII, já se traçava a primeira concepção científica sobre o risco de mudanças climáticas antropicamente induzidas, conhecida como "teoria do dessecamento", que relacionava a destruição da vegetação nativa com a redução da umidade, das chuvas e dos mananciais de água. O estabelecimento de bases mais sólidas deu-se apenas no início do século XVIII, por meio das investigações realizadas em Cambridge por John Wood e Stephen Hales.

A difusão dessa teoria encontrou um terreno especialmente fértil naquele momento histórico. Na Europa do século XVIII estavam sendo divulgadas diversas idéias sobre a influência do clima nas instituições e nos costumes dos povos através de pensadores como Hume e Montesquieu. Tais preocupações logo se expandiram para as colônias. A teoria que a destruição das florestas era responsável pelas secas e, no limite, pela desertificação capturou a imaginação de vários observadores da vida colonial. A condenação do desflorestamento, com base nessa teoria, ganhou um novo patamar político e econômico. Foi nesse contexto que, em 1823, José Bonifácio, geólogo, filósofo, poeta e "Patriarca da Independência do Brasil" advertiu que a falta das "chuvas fecundantes poderia reduzir o belo território brasileiro aos desertos da Líbia".

Após os primórdios das preocupações com risco de mudanças climáticas, antropogênicas, muitos cientistas começaram intensificar os estudos meteorológicos.

Em 1971, na Cidade do México, Miguel Ozório de Almeida demonstrou grande preocupação com as conseqüências da elevação da temperatura na Terra. Em 1988 realizou-se em Toronto a 1ª Conferência Climatológica Mundial, quando houve consenso de que as emissões de gases de efeito estufa deveriam ser neutralizadas consideravelmente. Foi criado, então, o Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudanças Climáticas – IPCC.

Em novembro de 1990 aconteceu em Genebra - onde está sediada a Organização Meteorológica Mundial, a 2ª Conferência Climatológica Mundial, quando foram analisados os relatórios preparados pelo IPCC, com a participação de mais de 300 cientistas de vinte países. A conclusão alcançada e expressa pelo mundo científico não foi capaz de evitar o fracasso da Conferência, quando, de concreto, houve apenas a concordância de 137 países em assinar a Convenção Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudanças do Clima por ocasião da ECO-92, no Rio de Janeiro.¹

Verifica-se claramente, que, desde então, alguns países têm assumido posições pouco conflitantes com suas economias, preocupados, na verdade, com a difícil e custosa

reforma nas suas políticas de energia e de consumo, deixando a preservação dos recursos naturais relegada a segundo plano.

Desta forma, o acordo alcançado em Genebra previa que todos os países adotassem limites de emissão, mas continha cláusulas destinadas à proteção dos interesses de países que se recusassem a aceitar quaisquer restrições à sua política na matéria. Desta forma, os Estados Unidos e a Rússia não se comprometeram em adotar controles de emissão, apesar da (vaga) declaração do então Presidente Americano, Bush, em fevereiro de 1990. O Japão e a Arábia Saudita também foram fortemente criticados, sendo que o último era contrário a qualquer medida capaz de prejudicar suas exportações de petróleo.

Em fevereiro de 1992, os Estados Unidos convocaram nova reunião em Virgínia onde afirmaram seu não comprometimento com a redução da emissão de gases de efeito estufa, alegando a necessidade de pesquisas mais convincentes sobre o tema.

Eventos cronológicos oficialmente registrados:

1878 - foi estabelecida a Organização Meteorológica Internacional

1947 - foi criada, pela convenção de Washington em 11 de outubro, a Organização Meteorológica Mundial (OMM), como organismo sucessor da Organização Meteorológica Internacional.

Desde 1968, a problemática do meio ambiente focou-se na preparação da Conferência de Estocolmo, especialmente consagrada a esse tema.

1972 - Foi realizada a Conferência de Estocolmo.

1972 - Foram criados organismos especializados, a Secretaria do Meio Ambiente, mais conhecido por UNEP (United Nations Environment Programme) - O PNUMA (Programa das Nações Unidas para o Meio Ambiente) e um Fundo das Nações Unidas para o Meio Ambiente.

1973 - Em junho, O PNUMA estabeleceu bases para a ação internacional

1975 - Em abril, através da terceira reunião de seu Conselho Diretivo, o PNUMA respaldou um programa para enfrentar os riscos à camada de ozônio

1976 - Em janeiro, emitiu o documento oficial para atacar o problema.

1976- Em abril, o Conselho decidiu convocar uma conferência internacional, para tratar aspectos todos os aspectos da camada de ozônio

1977- Em março, reúnem-se em Washington, especialistas de 32 países e estabelecem o "Plano Mundial de Ação sobre a Camada de Ozônio", o primeiro acordo internacional sobre o assunto, juntamente medidas de alguns países, para controlar CFCs.

1979 - O PNUMA e OMM copatrocinam a primeira conferência Mundial sobre o Clima, criando, ao mesmo tempo o programa Mundial sobre o Clima

1981 - Conselho diretivo cria um grupo de trabalho para preparar uma convenção sobre a proteção da Camada de Ozônio,

1985 - Final da preparação da convenção e após esses quatro anos, fica concluída e aprovada. É a primeira vez que os países propõe algo no sentido de fazer frente a um problema ambiental global, antes que seus efeitos tivessem sido demonstrados cientificamente.

1986 - Simpósio da Comunidade Européia sobre CO₂ e outros gases do efeito estufa em Bruxelas

1988 - O PNUMA e OMM criam IPCC: grupo de trabalho encarregado de preparar negociações de um tratado mundial, a fim de enfrentar o problema do aquecimento global, assim como de realizar as reuniões mundiais sobre o clima.

b- Convenção sobre Mudança do Clima

Uma resposta internacional à mudança climática tomou forma com a criação da Convenção Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudanças do Clima (CQNUMC), adotada em 1992, quando da Conferência das Nações Unidas sobre Meio Ambiente e Desenvolvimento Sustentável, conhecida como Eco-92.

A (CQNUMC) é uma Convenção-Quadro, uma vez que é bastante ampla e depende de regulamentação por parte do Executivo. Diante da necessidade de posterior regulamentação foi instituído um Órgão Supremo da Convenção, a Conferência das Partes, de reuniões espaçadas e compostas de altos representantes diplomáticos dos Estados-Partes, com poderes inclusive de emendar a Convenção e referendar as decisões dos dois Órgãos Subsidiários.

A Convenção estabelece, em seu art. 9º, um Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico (SBSTA), para prestar, em tempo oportuno, à Conferência das Partes e, conforme o caso, a seus órgãos subsidiários, informações e assessoramento sobre assuntos científicos e tecnológicos relativos à Convenção. Já o Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação (SBI) está estabelecido no art. 10 do referido diploma legal, com o fim de auxiliar a Conferência das Partes na avaliação e cumprimento efetivo da Convenção.

Já a Conferência das Partes – COP, o órgão supremo da Convenção, tem a responsabilidade de manter regularmente sob exame a implementação da Convenção, assim como quaisquer instrumentos jurídicos que a Conferência das Partes vier a adotar, além de tomar decisões necessárias para promover a efetiva implementação da Convenção (art. 7º da Convenção sobre Mudanças Climáticas).

A Convenção Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudanças do Clima foi adotada na Sede das Nações Unidas, na cidade de Nova York em 9 de maio de 1992.

No Brasil, foi aprovada pelo Congresso Nacional mediante o Decreto Legislativo n.º 1, de 03.02.1994 e promulgada pelo Decreto n.º 2.652, de 01.07.1998.

A Convenção começou a vigorar em 21 de março de 1994, 90 dias após sua 50ª ratificação.

No Direito Brasileiro, após assinado um tratado ou convenção internacional consoante, dispõe o art. 84, inciso VIII, da nossa Constituição Federal, seu texto é remetido ao Congresso Nacional, anexado a uma Mensagem do Presidente da República, endereçada ao Presidente da Câmara dos Deputados, na qual são resumidos os pontos importantes do ato internacional anexado, se for o caso, suas fases negociais e, sobretudo, as razões da importância daquele ato internacional no ordenamento jurídico brasileiro.

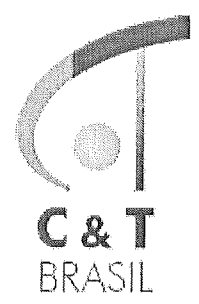
Terminada a votação do texto do tratado ou convenção internacional, é o mesmo publicado no Diário do Congresso Nacional, apenso a um Decreto Legislativo, expedido pelo Presidente do Congresso Nacional, atualmente Presidente do Senado, aprovando o referido tratado ou convenção.

Como já mencionado, a Conferência das Partes – COP, o órgão supremo da Convenção, tornou-se a mais alta autoridade da Convenção, se reunindo uma vez por ano, com intuito de formalizar acordos entre os países membros, com intuito final de mitigação dos efeitos da mudança do Clima.

Introdução

Quando adotaram a Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima, em 1992, os governos reconheceram que ela poderia ser a propulsora de ações mais enérgicas no futuro. Ao estabelecer um processo permanente de revisão, discussão e troca de informações, a Convenção possibilita a adoção de compromissos adicionais em resposta a mudanças no conhecimento científico e nas disposições políticas.

A primeira revisão da adequação dos compromissos dos países desenvolvidos foi conduzida, como previsto, na primeira sessão da Conferência das Partes (COP-1), que ocorreu em Berlim, em 1995. As Partes decidiram que o compromisso dos países desenvolvidos de voltar suas emissões para os níveis de 1990, até o ano 2000, era inadequado para se atingir o objetivo de longo prazo da Convenção, que consiste em impedir “uma interferência antrópica (produzida pelo homem) perigosa no sistema climático”.

Ministros e outras autoridades responderam com a adoção do “Mandato de Berlim” e com o início de um nova fase de discussões sobre o fortalecimento dos compromissos dos países desenvolvidos. O grupo Ad Hoc sobre o Mandato de Berlim (AGBM) foi então formado para elaborar o esboço de um acordo que, após oito sessões, foi encaminhado à COP-3 para negociação final.

Cerca de 10.000 delegados, observadores e jornalistas participaram desse evento de alto nível realizado em Quioto, Japão, em dezembro de 1997. A conferência culminou na decisão por consenso (1/CP.3) de adotar-se um Protocolo segundo o qual os países industrializados reduziriam suas emissões combinadas de gases de efeito estufa em pelo menos 5% em relação aos níveis de 1990 até o período entre 2008 e 2012. Esse compromisso, com vinculação legal, promete produzir uma reversão da tendência histórica de crescimento das emissões iniciadas nesses países há cerca de 150 anos.

O Protocolo de Quioto foi aberto para assinatura em 16 de março de 1998. Entrará em vigor 90 dias após a sua ratificação por pelo menos 55 Partes da Convenção, incluindo os países desenvolvidos que contabilizaram pelo menos 55% das emissões totais de dióxido de carbono em 1990 desse grupo de países industrializados. Enquanto isso, as Partes da Convenção sobre Mudança do Clima continuarão a observar os compromissos assumidos sob a Convenção e a preparar-se para a futura implementação do Protocolo.

PROTOCOLO DE QUIOTO À CONVENÇÃO-QUADRO DAS NAÇÕES UNIDAS SOBRE MUDANÇA DO CLIMA

As Partes deste Protocolo,

Sendo Partes da Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima, doravante denominada “Convenção”,

Procurando atingir o objetivo final da Convenção, conforme expresso no Artigo 2,

Lembrando as disposições da Convenção,

Seguindo as orientações do Artigo 3 da Convenção,

Em conformidade com o Mandato de Berlim adotado pela decisão 1/CP.1 da Conferência das Partes da Convenção em sua primeira sessão,

Convieram no seguinte:

ARTIGO 1

Para os fins deste Protocolo, aplicam-se as definições contidas no Artigo 1 da Convenção. Adicionalmente:

1. “Conferência das Partes” significa a Conferência das Partes da Convenção.
“Convenção” significa a Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima, adotada em Nova York em 9 de maio de 1992.
2. “Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima” significa o Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima estabelecido conjuntamente pela Organização Meteorológica Mundial e pelo Programa das Nações Unidas para o Meio Ambiente em 1988.
3. “Protocolo de Montreal” significa o Protocolo de Montreal sobre Substâncias que Destroem a Camada de Ozônio, adotado em Montreal em 16 de setembro de 1987 e com os ajustes e emendas adotados posteriormente.
4. “Partes presentes e votantes” significa as Partes presentes e que emitam voto afirmativo ou negativo.
5. “Parte” significa uma Parte deste Protocolo, a menos que de outra forma indicado pelo contexto.
6. “Parte incluída no Anexo I” significa uma Parte incluída no Anexo I da Convenção, com as emendas de que possa ser objeto, ou uma Parte que tenha feito uma notificação conforme previsto no Artigo 4, parágrafo 2(g), da Convenção.

ARTIGO 2

1. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I, ao cumprir seus compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões assumidos sob o Artigo 3, a fim de promover o desenvolvimento sustentável, deve:

(a) Implementar e/ou aprimorar políticas e medidas de acordo com suas circunstâncias nacionais, tais como:

- (i) O aumento da eficiência energética em setores relevantes da economia nacional;
- (ii) A proteção e o aumento de sumidouros e reservatórios de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, levando em conta seus compromissos assumidos em acordos internacionais relevantes sobre o meio ambiente, a promoção de práticas sustentáveis de manejo florestal, florestamento e reflorestamento;
- (iii) A promoção de formas sustentáveis de agricultura à luz das considerações sobre a mudança do clima;
- (iv) A pesquisa, a promoção, o desenvolvimento e o aumento do uso de formas novas e renováveis de energia, de tecnologias de sequestro de dióxido de carbono e de tecnologias ambientalmente seguras, que sejam avançadas e inovadoras;
- (v) A redução gradual ou eliminação de imperfeições de mercado, de incentivos fiscais, de isenções tributárias e tarifárias e de subsídios para todos os setores emissores de gases de efeito estufa que sejam contrários ao objetivo da Convenção e aplicação de instrumentos de mercado;
- (vi) O estímulo a reformas adequadas em setores relevantes, visando a promoção de políticas e medidas que limitem ou reduzam emissões de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal;
- (vii) Medidas para limitar e/ou reduzir as emissões de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal no setor de transportes;
- (viii) A limitação e/ou redução de emissões de metano por meio de sua recuperação e utilização no tratamento de resíduos, bem como na produção, no transporte e na distribuição de energia;

(b) Cooperar com outras Partes incluídas no Anexo I no aumento da eficácia individual e combinada de suas políticas e medidas adotadas segundo este Artigo, conforme o Artigo 4, parágrafo 2(e)(i), da Convenção. Para esse fim, essas Partes devem adotar medidas para compartilhar experiências e trocar informações sobre tais políticas e medidas, inclusive desenvolvendo formas de melhorar sua comparabilidade, transparência e eficácia. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, em sua

primeira sessão ou tão logo seja praticável a partir de então, considerar maneiras de facilitar tal cooperação, levando em conta toda a informação relevante.

2. As Partes incluídas no Anexo I devem procurar limitar ou reduzir as emissões de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal originárias de combustíveis do transporte aéreo e marítimo internacional, conduzindo o trabalho pela Organização de Aviação Civil Internacional e pela Organização Marítima Internacional, respectivamente.

3. As Partes incluídas no Anexo I devem empenhar-se em implementar políticas e medidas a que se refere este Artigo de forma a minimizar efeitos adversos, incluindo os efeitos adversos da mudança do clima, os efeitos sobre o comércio internacional e os impactos sociais, ambientais e econômicos sobre outras Partes, especialmente as Partes países em desenvolvimento e em particular as identificadas no Artigo 4, parágrafos 8 e 9, da Convenção, levando em conta o Artigo 3 da Convenção. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo pode realizar ações adicionais, conforme o caso, para promover a implementação das disposições deste parágrafo.

4. Caso a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo considere proveitoso coordenar qualquer uma das políticas e medidas do parágrafo 1(a) acima, levando em conta as diferentes circunstâncias nacionais e os possíveis efeitos, deve considerar modos e meios de definir a coordenação de tais políticas e medidas.

ARTIGO 3

1. As Partes incluídas no Anexo I devem, individual ou conjuntamente, assegurar que suas emissões antrópicas agregadas, expressas em dióxido de carbono equivalente, dos gases de efeito estufa listados no Anexo A não excedam suas quantidades atribuídas, calculadas em conformidade com seus compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões descritos no Anexo B e de acordo com as disposições deste Artigo, com vistas a reduzir suas emissões totais desses gases em pelo menos 5 por cento abaixo dos níveis de 1990 no período de compromisso de 2008 a 2012.

2. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve, até 2005, ter realizado um progresso comprovado para alcançar os compromissos assumidos sob este Protocolo.

3. As variações líquidas nas emissões por fontes e remoções por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa resultantes de mudança direta, induzida pelo homem, no uso da terra e nas atividades florestais, limitadas ao florestamento, reflorestamento e desflorestamento desde 1990, medidas como variações verificáveis nos estoques de carbono em cada período de compromisso, deverão ser utilizadas para atender os compromissos assumidos sob este Artigo por cada Parte incluída no Anexo I. As emissões por fontes e remoções por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa associadas a essas atividades devem ser relatadas de maneira transparente e comprovável e revistas em conformidade com os Artigos 7 e 8.

4. Antes da primeira sessão da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve submeter à consideração do Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico dados para o estabelecimento do seu nível de estoques de carbono em 1990 e possibilitar a estimativa das suas mudanças nos estoques de carbono nos anos subsequentes. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, em sua primeira sessão ou assim que seja praticável a partir de então, decidir sobre as modalidades, regras e diretrizes sobre como e quais são as atividades adicionais induzidas pelo homem relacionadas com mudanças nas emissões por fontes e remoções por sumidouros de gases de efeito

estufa nas categorias de solos agrícolas e de mudança no uso da terra e florestas, que devem ser acrescentadas ou subtraídas da quantidade atribuída para as Partes incluídas no Anexo I, levando em conta as incertezas, a transparência na elaboração de relatório, a comprovação, o trabalho metodológico do Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima, o assessoramento fornecido pelo Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico em conformidade com o Artigo 5 e as decisões da Conferência das Partes. Tal decisão será aplicada a partir do segundo período de compromisso. A Parte poderá optar por aplicar essa decisão sobre as atividades adicionais induzidas pelo homem no seu primeiro período de compromisso, desde que essas atividades tenham se realizado a partir de 1990.

5. As Partes em processo de transição para uma economia de mercado incluídas no Anexo I, cujo ano ou período de base foi estabelecido em conformidade com a decisão 9/CP.2 da Conferência das Partes em sua segunda sessão, devem usar esse ano ou período de base para a implementação dos seus compromissos previstos neste Artigo. Qualquer outra Parte em processo de transição para uma economia de mercado incluída no Anexo I que ainda não tenha submetido a sua primeira comunicação nacional, conforme o Artigo 12 da Convenção, também pode notificar a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo da sua intenção de utilizar um ano ou período históricos de base que não 1990 para a implementação de seus compromissos previstos neste Artigo. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve decidir sobre a aceitação de tal notificação.

6. Levando em conta o Artigo 4, parágrafo 6, da Convenção, na implementação dos compromissos assumidos sob este Protocolo que não os deste Artigo, a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo concederá um certo grau de flexibilidade às Partes em processo de transição para uma economia de mercado incluídas no Anexo I.

7. No primeiro período de compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões, de 2008 a 2012, a quantidade atribuída para cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve ser igual à porcentagem descrita no Anexo B de suas emissões antrópicas agregadas, expressas em dióxido de carbono equivalente, dos gases de efeito estufa listados no Anexo A em 1990, ou o ano ou período de base determinado em conformidade com o parágrafo 5 acima, multiplicado por cinco. As Partes incluídas no Anexo I para as quais a mudança no uso da terra e florestas constituíram uma fonte líquida de emissões de gases de efeito estufa em 1990 devem fazer constar, no seu ano ou período de base de emissões de 1990, as emissões antrópicas agregadas por fontes menos as remoções antrópicas por sumidouros em 1990, expressas em dióxido de carbono equivalente, devidas à mudança no uso da terra, com a finalidade de calcular sua quantidade atribuída.

8. Qualquer Parte incluída no Anexo I pode utilizar 1995 como o ano base para os hidrofluorcarbonos, perfluorcarbonos e hexafluoreto de enxofre, na realização dos cálculos mencionados no parágrafo 7 acima.

9. Os compromissos das Partes incluídas no Anexo I para os períodos subsequentes devem ser estabelecidos em emendas ao Anexo B deste Protocolo, que devem ser adotadas em conformidade com as disposições do Artigo 21, parágrafo 7. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve dar início à consideração de tais compromissos pelo menos sete anos antes do término do primeiro período de compromisso ao qual se refere o parágrafo 1 acima.

10. Qualquer unidade de redução de emissões, ou qualquer parte de uma quantidade atribuída, que uma Parte adquira de outra Parte em conformidade com as disposições do Artigo 6 ou do Artigo 17 deve ser acrescentada à quantidade atribuída à Parte adquirente.

11. Qualquer unidade de redução de emissões, ou qualquer parte de uma quantidade atribuída, que uma Parte transfira para outra Parte em conformidade com as disposições do Artigo 6 ou do Artigo 17 deve ser subtraída da quantidade atribuída à Parte transferidora.

12. Qualquer redução certificada de emissões que uma Parte adquira de outra Parte em conformidade com as disposições do Artigo 12 deve ser acrescentada à quantidade atribuída à Parte adquirente.

13. Se as emissões de uma Parte incluída no Anexo I em um período de compromisso forem inferiores a sua quantidade atribuída prevista neste Artigo, essa diferença, mediante solicitação dessa Parte, deve ser acrescentada à quantidade atribuída a essa Parte para períodos de compromisso subsequentes.

14. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve empenhar-se para implementar os compromissos mencionados no parágrafo 1 acima de forma que sejam minimizados os efeitos adversos, tanto sociais como ambientais e econômicos, sobre as Partes países em desenvolvimento, particularmente as identificadas no Artigo 4, parágrafos 8 e 9, da Convenção. Em consonância com as decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes sobre a implementação desses parágrafos, a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, em sua primeira sessão, considerar quais as ações se fazem necessárias para minimizar os efeitos adversos da mudança do clima e/ou os impactos de medidas de resposta sobre as Partes mencionadas nesses parágrafos. Entre as questões a serem consideradas devem estar a obtenção de fundos, seguro e transferência de tecnologia.

ARTIGO 4

1. Qualquer Parte incluída no Anexo I que tenha acordado em cumprir conjuntamente seus compromissos assumidos sob o Artigo 3 será considerada como tendo cumprido esses compromissos se o total combinado de suas emissões antrópicas agregadas, expressas em dióxido de carbono equivalente, dos gases de efeito estufa listados no Anexo A não exceder suas quantidades atribuídas, calculadas de acordo com seus compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões, descritos no Anexo B, e em conformidade com as disposições do Artigo 3. O respectivo nível de emissão determinado para cada uma das Partes do acordo deve ser nele especificado.

2. As Partes de qualquer um desses acordos devem notificar o Secretariado sobre os termos do acordo na data de depósito de seus instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão a este Protocolo. O Secretariado, por sua vez, deve informar os termos do acordo às Partes e aos signatários da Convenção.

3. Qualquer desses acordos deve permanecer em vigor durante o período de compromisso especificado no Artigo 3, parágrafo 7.

4. Se as Partes atuando conjuntamente assim o fizerem no âmbito de uma organização regional de integração econômica e junto com ela, qualquer alteração na composição da organização após a adoção deste Protocolo não deverá afetar compromissos existentes no âmbito deste Protocolo. Qualquer alteração na composição da organização só será válida para fins dos compromissos previstos no Artigo 3 que sejam adotados em período subsequente ao dessa alteração.

5. Caso as Partes desses acordos não atinjam seu nível total combinado de redução de emissões, cada Parte desses acordos deve se responsabilizar pelo seu próprio nível de emissões determinado no acordo.

6. Se as Partes atuando conjuntamente assim o fizerem no âmbito de uma organização regional de integração econômica que seja Parte deste Protocolo e junto com ela, cada Estado-Membro dessa organização regional de integração econômica individual e conjuntamente com a organização regional de integração econômica, atuando em conformidade com o Artigo 24, no caso de não ser atingido o nível total combinado de redução de emissões, deve se responsabilizar por seu nível de emissões como notificado em conformidade com este Artigo.

ARTIGO 5

1. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve estabelecer, dentro do período máximo de um ano antes do início do primeiro período de compromisso, um sistema nacional para a estimativa das emissões antrópicas por fontes e das remoções antrópicas por sumidouros de todos os gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal. As diretrizes para tais sistemas nacionais, que devem incorporar as metodologias especificadas no parágrafo 2 abaixo, devem ser decididas pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo em sua primeira sessão.

2. As metodologias para a estimativa das emissões antrópicas por fontes e das remoções antrópicas por sumidouros de todos os gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal devem ser as aceitas pelo Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima e acordadas pela Conferência das Partes em sua terceira sessão. Onde não forem utilizadas tais metodologias, ajustes adequados devem ser feitos de acordo com as metodologias acordadas pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo em sua primeira sessão. Com base no trabalho, inter alia, do Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima e no assessoramento prestado pelo Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico, a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve rever periodicamente e, conforme o caso, revisar tais metodologias e ajustes, levando plenamente em conta qualquer decisão pertinente da Conferência das Partes. Qualquer revisão das metodologias ou ajustes deve ser utilizada somente com o propósito de garantir o cumprimento dos compromissos previstos no Artigo 3 com relação a qualquer período de compromisso adotado posteriormente a essa revisão.

3. Os potenciais de aquecimento global utilizados para calcular a equivalência em dióxido de carbono das emissões antrópicas por fontes e das remoções antrópicas por sumidouros dos gases de efeito estufa listados no Anexo A devem ser os aceitos pelo Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima e acordados pela Conferência das Partes em sua terceira sessão. Com base no trabalho, inter alia, do Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima e no assessoramento prestado pelo Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico, a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve rever periodicamente e, conforme o caso, revisar o potencial de aquecimento global de cada um dos gases de efeito estufa, levando plenamente em conta qualquer decisão pertinente da Conferência das Partes. Qualquer revisão de um potencial de aquecimento global deve ser aplicada somente aos compromissos assumidos sob o Artigo 3 com relação a qualquer período de compromisso adotado posteriormente a essa revisão.

ARTIGO 6

1. A fim de cumprir os compromissos assumidos sob o Artigo 3, qualquer Parte incluída no Anexo I pode transferir para ou adquirir de qualquer outra dessas Partes unidades de redução de emissões resultantes de projetos visando a redução das emissões antrópicas por fontes ou o aumento das remoções antrópicas por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa em qualquer setor da economia, desde que:

- (a) O projeto tenha a aprovação das Partes envolvidas;
- (b) O projeto promova uma redução das emissões por fontes ou um aumento das remoções por sumidouros que sejam adicionais aos que ocorreriam na sua ausência;
- (c) A Parte não adquira nenhuma unidade de redução de emissões se não estiver em conformidade com suas obrigações assumidas sob os Artigos 5 e 7; e
- (d) A aquisição de unidades de redução de emissões seja suplementar às ações domésticas realizadas com o fim de cumprir os compromissos previstos no Artigo 3.

2. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo pode, em sua primeira sessão ou assim que seja viável a partir de então, aprimorar diretrizes para a implementação deste Artigo, incluindo para verificação e elaboração de relatórios.

3. Uma Parte incluída no Anexo I pode autorizar entidades jurídicas a participarem, sob sua responsabilidade, de ações que promovam a geração, a transferência ou a aquisição, sob este Artigo, de unidades de redução de emissões.

4. Se uma questão de implementação por uma Parte incluída no Anexo I das exigências mencionadas neste parágrafo é identificada de acordo com as disposições pertinentes do Artigo 8, as transferências e aquisições de unidades de redução de emissões podem continuar a ser feitas depois de ter sido identificada a questão, desde que quaisquer dessas unidades não sejam usadas pela Parte para atender os seus compromissos assumidos sob o Artigo 3 até que seja resolvida qualquer questão de cumprimento.

ARTIGO 7

1. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve incorporar ao seu inventário anual de emissões antrópicas por fontes e remoções antrópicas por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, submetido de acordo com as decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes, as informações suplementares necessárias com o propósito de assegurar o cumprimento do Artigo 3, a serem determinadas em conformidade com o parágrafo 4 abaixo.

2. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve incorporar à sua comunicação nacional, submetida de acordo com o Artigo 12 da Convenção, as informações suplementares necessárias para demonstrar o cumprimento dos compromissos assumidos sob este Protocolo, a serem determinadas em conformidade com o parágrafo 4 abaixo.

3. Cada Parte incluída no Anexo I deve submeter as informações solicitadas no parágrafo 1 acima anualmente, começando com o primeiro inventário que deve ser entregue, segundo a Convenção, no primeiro ano do período de compromisso após a entrada em vigor deste Protocolo para essa Parte.

Cada uma dessas Partes deve submeter as informações solicitadas no parágrafo 2 acima como parte da primeira comunicação nacional que deve ser entregue, segundo a Convenção, após a entrada em vigor deste Protocolo para a Parte e após a adoção de diretrizes como previsto no parágrafo 4 abaixo. A freqüência das submissões subsequentes das informações solicitadas sob este Artigo deve ser determinada pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, levando em conta qualquer prazo para a submissão de comunicações nacionais conforme decidido pela Conferência das Partes.

4. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve adotar em sua primeira sessão, e rever periodicamente a partir de então, diretrizes para apreparação das informações solicitadas sob este Artigo, levando em conta as diretrizes para a preparação de comunicações nacionais das Partes incluídas no Anexo I, adotadas pela Conferência das Partes. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve também, antes do primeiro período de compromisso, decidir sobre as modalidades de contabilização das quantidades atribuídas.

ARTIGO 8

1. As informações submetidas de acordo com o Artigo 7 por cada Parte incluída no Anexo I devem ser revistas por equipes revisoras de especialistas em conformidade com as decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes e em consonância com as diretrizes adotadas com esse propósito pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, conforme o parágrafo 4 abaixo. As informações submetidas segundo o Artigo 7, parágrafo 1, por cada Parte incluída no Anexo I devem ser revistas como parte da compilação anual e contabilização dos inventários de emissões e das quantidades atribuídas. Adicionalmente, as informações submetidas de acordo com o Artigo 7, parágrafo 2, por cada Parte incluída no Anexo I devem ser revistas como parte da revisão das comunicações.

2. As equipes revisoras de especialistas devem ser coordenadas pelo Secretariado e compostas por especialistas selecionados a partir de indicações das Partes da Convenção e, conforme o caso, de organizações intergovernamentais, em conformidade com a orientação dada para esse fim pela Conferência das Partes.

3. O processo de revisão deve produzir uma avaliação técnica completa e abrangente de todos os aspectos da implementação deste Protocolo por uma Parte. As equipes revisoras de especialistas devem preparar um relatório para a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, avaliando a implementação dos compromissos da Parte e identificando possíveis problemas e fatores que possam estar influenciando a efetivação dos compromissos. Esses relatórios devem ser distribuídos pelo Secretariado a todas as Partes da Convenção. O Secretariado deve listar as questões de implementação indicadas em tais relatórios para posterior consideração pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo.

4. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve adotar em sua primeira sessão, e rever periodicamente a partir de então, as diretrizes para a revisão da implementação deste Protocolo por equipes revisoras de especialistas, levando em conta as decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes.

5. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, com a assistência do Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação e, conforme o caso, do Órgão de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico, considerar:

(a) As informações submetidas pelas Partes segundo o Artigo 7 e os relatórios das revisões dos especialistas sobre essas informações, elaborados de acordo com este Artigo; e

(b) As questões de implementação listadas pelo Secretariado em conformidade com o parágrafo 3 acima, bem como qualquer questão levantada pelas Partes.

6. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve tomar decisões sobre qualquer assunto necessário para a implementação deste Protocolo de acordo com as considerações feitas sobre as informações a que se refere o parágrafo 5 acima.

ARTIGO 9

1. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve rever periodicamente este Protocolo à luz das melhores informações e avaliações científicas disponíveis sobre a mudança do clima e seus impactos, bem como de informações técnicas, sociais e econômicas relevantes. Tais revisões devem ser coordenadas com revisões pertinentes segundo a Convenção, em particular as dispostas no Artigo 4, parágrafo 2(d), e Artigo 7, parágrafo 2(a), da Convenção. Com base nessas revisões, a Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve tomar as providências adequadas.

2. A primeira revisão deve acontecer na segunda sessão da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo. Revisões subseqüentes devem acontecer em intervalos regulares e de maneira oportuna.

ARTIGO 10

Todas as Partes, levando em conta suas responsabilidades comuns mas diferenciadas e suas prioridades de desenvolvimento, objetivos e circunstâncias específicos, nacionais e regionais, sem a introdução de qualquer novo compromisso para as Partes não incluídas no Anexo I, mas reafirmando os compromissos existentes no Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, da Convenção, e continuando a fazer avançar a implementação desses compromissos a fim de atingir o desenvolvimento sustentável, levando em conta o Artigo 4, parágrafos 3, 5 e 7, da Convenção, devem:

(a) Formular, quando apropriado e na medida do possível, programas nacionais e, conforme o caso, regionais adequados, eficazes em relação aos custos, para melhorar a qualidade dos fatores de emissão, dados de atividade e/ou modelos locais que reflitam as condições socioeconômicas de cada Parte para a preparação e atualização periódica de inventários nacionais de emissões antrópicas por fontes e remoções antrópicas por sumidouros de todos os gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal, empregando metodologias comparáveis a serem acordadas pela Conferência das Partes e consistentes com as diretrizes para a preparação de comunicações nacionais adotadas pela Conferência das Partes;

(b) Formular, implementar, publicar e atualizar regularmente programas nacionais e, conforme o caso, regionais, que contenham medidas para mitigar a mudança do clima bem como medidas para facilitar uma adaptação adequada à mudança do clima:

(i) Tais programas envolveriam, entre outros, os setores de energia, transporte e indústria, bem como os de agricultura, florestas e tratamento de resíduos. Além disso, tecnologias e métodos de adaptação para aperfeiçoar o planejamento espacial melhorariam a adaptação à mudança do clima; e

(ii) As Partes incluídas no Anexo I devem submeter informações sobre ações no âmbito deste Protocolo, incluindo programas nacionais, em conformidade com o Artigo 7; e as outras Partes devem buscar incluir em suas comunicações nacionais, conforme o caso, informações sobre programas que contenham medidas que a Parte acredite contribuir para enfrentar a mudança do clima e seus efeitos adversos, incluindo a redução dos aumentos das emissões de gases de efeito estufa e aumento dos sumidouros e remoções, capacitação e medidas de adaptação;

(c) Cooperar na promoção de modalidades efetivas para o desenvolvimento, a aplicação e a difusão, e tomar todas as medidas possíveis para promover, facilitar e financiar, conforme o caso, a transferência ou o acesso a tecnologias, know-how, práticas e processos ambientalmente seguros relativos à mudança do clima, em particular para os países em desenvolvimento, incluindo a formulação de políticas e programas para a transferência efetiva de tecnologias ambientalmente seguras que sejam de propriedade pública ou de domínio público e a criação, no setor privado, de um ambiente propício para promover e melhorar a transferência de tecnologias ambientalmente seguras e o acesso a elas;

(d) Cooperar nas pesquisas científicas e técnicas e promover a manutenção e o desenvolvimento de sistemas de observação sistemática e o desenvolvimento de arquivos de dados para reduzir as incertezas relacionadas ao sistema climático, os efeitos adversos da mudança do clima e as conseqüências econômicas e sociais das várias estratégias de resposta e promover o desenvolvimento e o fortalecimento da capacidade e dos recursos endógenos para participar dos esforços, programas e redes internacionais e intergovernamentais de pesquisa e observação sistemática, levando em conta o Artigo 5 da Convenção;

(e) Cooperar e promover em nível internacional e, conforme o caso, por meio de organismos existentes, a elaboração e a execução de programas de educação e treinamento, incluindo o fortalecimento da capacitação nacional, em particular a capacitação humana e institucional e o intercâmbio ou cessão de pessoal para treinar especialistas nessas áreas, em particular para os países em desenvolvimento, e facilitar em nível nacional a conscientização pública e o acesso público a informações sobre a mudança do clima. Modalidades adequadas devem ser desenvolvidas para implementar essas atividades por meio dos órgãos apropriados da Convenção, levando em conta o Artigo 6 da Convenção;

(f) Incluir em suas comunicações nacionais informações sobre programas e atividades empreendidos em conformidade com este Artigo de acordo com as decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes; e

(g) Levar plenamente em conta, na implementação dos compromissos previstos neste Artigo, o Artigo 4, parágrafo 8, da Convenção.

ARTIGO 11

1. Na implementação do Artigo 10, as Partes devem levar em conta as disposições do Artigo 4, parágrafos 4, 5, 7, 8 e 9, da Convenção.

2. No contexto da implementação do Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, da Convenção, em conformidade com as disposições do Artigo 4, parágrafo 3, e do Artigo 11 da Convenção, e por meio da entidade ou entidades encarregadas da operação do mecanismo financeiro da Convenção, as Partes países desenvolvidos e as demais Partes desenvolvidas incluídas no Anexo II da Convenção devem:

(a) Prover recursos financeiros novos e adicionais para cobrir integralmente os custos por elas acordados incorridos pelas Partes países em desenvolvimento para fazer avançar a implementação dos compromissos assumidos sob o Artigo 4, parágrafo 1(a), da Convenção e previstos no Artigo 10, alínea (a); e

(b) Também prover esses recursos financeiros, inclusive para a transferência de tecnologia, de que necessitem as Partes países em desenvolvimento para cobrir integralmente os custos incrementais para fazer avançar a implementação dos compromissos existentes sob o Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, da Convenção e descritos no Artigo 10 e que sejam acordados entre uma Parte país em desenvolvimento e a entidade ou entidades internacionais a que se refere o Artigo 11 da Convenção, em conformidade com esse Artigo.

A implementação desses compromissos existentes deve levar em conta a necessidade de que o fluxo de recursos financeiros seja adequado e previsível e a importância da divisão adequada do ônus entre as Partes países desenvolvidos. A orientação para a entidade ou entidades encarregadas da operação do mecanismo financeiro da Convenção em decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes, incluindo as acordadas antes da adoção deste Protocolo, aplica-se mutatis mutandis às disposições deste parágrafo.

3. As Partes países desenvolvidos e demais Partes desenvolvidas do Anexo II da Convenção podem também prover recursos financeiros para a implementação do Artigo 10 por meio de canais bilaterais, regionais e multilaterais e as Partes países em desenvolvimento podem deles beneficiar-se.

ARTIGO 12

1. Fica definido um mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo.

2. O objetivo do mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo deve ser assistir às Partes não incluídas no Anexo I para que atinjam o desenvolvimento sustentável e contribuam para o objetivo final da Convenção, e assistir às Partes incluídas no Anexo I para que cumpram seus compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões, assumidos no Artigo 3.

3. Sob o mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo:

(a) As Partes não incluídas no Anexo I beneficiar-se-ão de atividades de projetos que resultem em reduções certificadas de emissões; e

(b) As Partes incluídas no Anexo I podem utilizar as reduções certificadas de emissões, resultantes de tais atividades de projetos, para contribuir com o cumprimento de parte de seus compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões, assumidos no Artigo 3, como determinado pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo.

4. O mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo deve sujeitar-se à autoridade e orientação da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo e à supervisão de um conselho executivo do mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo.

5. As reduções de emissões resultantes de cada atividade de projeto devem ser certificadas por entidades operacionais a serem designadas pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, com base em:

(a) Participação voluntária aprovada por cada Parte envolvida;

(b) Benefícios reais, mensuráveis e de longo prazo relacionados com a mitigação da mudança do clima, e

(c) Reduções de emissões que sejam adicionais as que ocorreriam na ausência da atividade certificada de projeto.

6. O mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo deve prestar assistência quanto à obtenção de fundos para atividades certificadas de projetos quando necessário.

7. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, em sua primeira sessão, elaborar modalidades e procedimentos com o objetivo de assegurar transparência, eficiência e prestação de contas das atividades de projetos por meio de auditorias e verificações independentes.

8. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve assegurar que uma fração dos fundos advindos de atividades de projetos certificadas seja utilizada para cobrir despesas administrativas, assim como assistir às Partes países em desenvolvimento que sejam particularmente vulneráveis aos efeitos adversos da mudança do clima para fazer face aos custos de adaptação.

9. A participação no mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo, incluindo nas atividades mencionadas no parágrafo 3(a) acima e na aquisição de reduções certificadas de emissão, pode envolver entidades privadas e/ou públicas e deve sujeitar-se a qualquer orientação que possa ser dada pelo conselho executivo do mecanismo de desenvolvimento limpo.

10. Reduções certificadas de emissões obtidas durante o período do ano 2000 até o início do primeiro período de compromisso podem ser utilizadas para auxiliar no cumprimento das responsabilidades relativas ao primeiro período de compromisso.

ARTIGO 13

1. A Conferência das Partes, o órgão supremo da Convenção, deve atuar na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo.
2. As Partes da Convenção que não sejam Partes deste Protocolo podem participar como observadoras das deliberações de qualquer sessão da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo. Quando a Conferência das Partes atuar na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, as decisões tomadas sob este Protocolo devem ser tomadas somente por aquelas que sejam Partes deste Protocolo.
3. Quando a Conferência das Partes atuar na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, qualquer membro da Mesa da Conferência das Partes representando uma Parte da Convenção mas, nessa ocasião, não uma Parte deste Protocolo, deve ser substituído por um outro membro, escolhido entre as Partes deste Protocolo e por elas eleito.
4. A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve manter a implementação deste Protocolo sob revisão periódica e tomar, dentro de seu mandato, as decisões necessárias para promover a sua implementação efetiva. Deve executar as funções a ela atribuídas por este Protocolo e deve:

 - (b) Examinar periodicamente as obrigações das Partes deste Protocolo, com a devida consideração a qualquer revisão exigida pelo Artigo 4, parágrafo 2(d), e Artigo 7, parágrafo 2, da Convenção, à luz do seu objetivo, da experiência adquirida em sua implementação e da evolução dos conhecimentos científicos e tecnológicos, e a esse respeito, considerar e adotar relatórios periódicos sobre a implementação deste Protocolo;
 - (c) Promover e facilitar o intercâmbio de informações sobre medidas adotadas pelas Partes para enfrentar a mudança do clima e seus efeitos, levando em conta as diferentes circunstâncias, responsabilidades e recursos das Partes e seus respectivos compromissos assumidos sob este Protocolo;
 - (d) Facilitar, mediante solicitação de duas ou mais Partes, a coordenação de medidas por elas adotadas para enfrentar a mudança do clima e seus efeitos, levando em conta as diferentes circunstâncias, responsabilidades e capacidades das Partes e seus respectivos compromissos assumidos sob este Protocolo;
 - (e) Promover e orientar, em conformidade com o objetivo da Convenção e as disposições deste Protocolo, e levando plenamente em conta as decisões pertinentes da Conferência das Partes, o desenvolvimento e aperfeiçoamento periódico de metodologias comparáveis para a implementação efetiva deste Protocolo, a serem acordadas pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo;
 - (f) Fazer recomendações sobre qualquer assunto necessário à implementação deste Protocolo;

(g) Procurar mobilizar recursos financeiros adicionais em conformidade com o Artigo 11, parágrafo 2;

(h) Estabelecer os órgãos subsidiários considerados necessários à implementação deste Protocolo;

(i) Buscar e utilizar, conforme o caso, os serviços e a cooperação das organizações internacionais e dos organismos intergovernamentais e não-governamentais competentes, bem como as informações por eles fornecidas; e

(j) Desempenhar as demais funções necessárias à implementação deste Protocolo e considerar qualquer atribuição resultante de uma decisão da Conferência das Partes.

5. As regras de procedimento da Conferência das Partes e os procedimentos financeiros aplicados sob a Convenção devem ser aplicados mutatis mutandis sob este Protocolo, exceto quando decidido de outra forma por consenso pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo.

6. A primeira sessão da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve ser convocada pelo Secretariado juntamente com a primeira sessão da Conferência das Partes programada para depois da data de entrada em vigor deste Protocolo. As sessões ordinárias subsequentes da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo devem ser realizadas anualmente e em conjunto com as sessões ordinárias da Conferência das Partes a menos que decidido de outra forma pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo.

7. As sessões extraordinárias da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo devem ser realizadas em outras datas quando julgado necessário pela Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, ou por solicitação escrita de qualquer Parte, desde que, dentro de seis meses após a solicitação ter sido comunicada às Partes pelo Secretariado, receba o apoio de pelo menos um terço das Partes.

8. As Nações Unidas, seus órgãos especializados e a Agência Internacional de Energia Atômica, bem como qualquer Estado-Membro dessas organizações ou observador junto às mesmas que não seja Parte desta Convenção podem se fazer representar como observadores nas sessões da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo. Qualquer outro órgão ou agência, nacional ou internacional, governamental ou não-governamental, competente em assuntos de que trata este Protocolo e que tenha informado ao Secretariado o seu desejo de se fazer representar como observador numa sessão da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo, pode ser admitido nessa qualidade, salvo se pelo menos um terço das Partes presentes objete. A admissão e participação dos observadores devem sujeitar-se às regras de procedimento a que se refere o parágrafo 5 acima.

ARTIGO 14

1. O Secretariado estabelecido pelo Artigo 8 da Convenção deve desempenhar a função de Secretariado deste Protocolo.
2. O Artigo 8, parágrafo 2, da Convenção, sobre as funções do Secretariado e o Artigo 8, parágrafo 3, da Convenção, sobre as providências tomadas para o seu funcionamento, devem ser aplicados mutatis mutandis a este Protocolo. O Secretariado deve, além disso, exercer as funções a ele atribuídas sob este Protocolo.

ARTIGO 15

1. O Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico e o Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação estabelecidos nos Artigos 9 e 10 da Convenção devem atuar, respectivamente, como o Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico e o Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação deste Protocolo. As disposições relacionadas com o funcionamento desses dois órgãos sob a Convenção devem ser aplicadas mutatis mutandis a este Protocolo. As sessões das reuniões do Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico e do Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação deste Protocolo devem ser realizadas conjuntamente com as reuniões do Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico e do Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação da Convenção, respectivamente.
2. As Partes da Convenção que não são Partes deste Protocolo podem participar como observadoras das deliberações de qualquer sessão dos órgãos subsidiários. Quando os órgãos subsidiários atuarem como órgãos subsidiários deste Protocolo, as decisões sob este Protocolo devem ser tomadas somente por aquelas que sejam Partes deste Protocolo.
3. Quando os órgãos subsidiários estabelecidos pelos Artigos 9 e 10 da Convenção exerçam suas funções com relação a assuntos que dizem respeito a este Protocolo, qualquer membro das Mesas desses órgãos subsidiários representando uma Parte da Convenção, mas nessa ocasião, não uma Parte deste Protocolo, deve ser substituído por um outro membro escolhido entre as Partes deste Protocolo e por elas eleito.

ARTIGO 16

A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, tão logo seja possível, considerar a aplicação a este Protocolo, e modificação conforme o caso, do processo multilateral de consultas a que se refere o Artigo 13 da Convenção, à luz de qualquer decisão pertinente que possa ser tomada pela Conferência das Partes. Qualquer processo multilateral de consultas que possa ser aplicado a este Protocolo deve operar sem prejuízo dos procedimentos e mecanismos estabelecidos em conformidade com o Artigo 18.

ARTIGO 17

A Conferência das Partes deve definir os princípios, as modalidades, regras e diretrizes apropriados, em particular para verificação, elaboração de relatórios e prestação de contas do comércio de emissões. As Partes incluídas no Anexo B podem participar do comércio de emissões com o objetivo de cumprir os compromissos assumidos sob o Artigo 3. Tal comércio deve ser suplementar às ações domésticas com vistas a atender os compromissos quantificados de limitação e redução de emissões, assumidos sob esse Artigo.

ARTIGO 18

A Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo deve, em sua primeira sessão, aprovar procedimentos e mecanismos adequados e eficazes para determinar e tratar de casos de não-cumprimento das disposições deste Protocolo, inclusive por meio do desenvolvimento de uma lista indicando possíveis conseqüências, levando em conta a causa, o tipo, o grau e a freqüência do não-cumprimento. Qualquer procedimento e mecanismo sob este Artigo que acarrete conseqüências de caráter vinculante deve ser adotado por meio de uma emenda a este Protocolo.

ARTIGO 19

As disposições do Artigo 14 da Convenção sobre a solução de controvérsias aplicam-se mutatis mutandis a este Protocolo.

ARTIGO 20

1. Qualquer Parte pode propor emendas a este Protocolo.
2. As emendas a este Protocolo devem ser adotadas em sessão ordinária da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo. O texto de qualquer emenda proposta a este Protocolo deve ser comunicado às Partes pelo Secretariado pelo menos seis meses antes da sessão em que será proposta sua adoção. O texto de qualquer emenda proposta deve também ser comunicado pelo Secretariado às Partes e aos signatários da Convenção e, para informação, ao Depositário.
3. As Partes devem fazer todo o possível para chegar a acordo por consenso sobre qualquer emenda proposta a este Protocolo. Uma vez exauridos todos os esforços para chegar a um consenso sem que se tenha chegado a um acordo, a emenda deve ser adotada, em última instância, por maioria de três quartos dos votos das Partes presentes e votantes na sessão. A emenda adotada deve ser comunicada pelo Secretariado ao Depositário, que deve comunicá-la a todas as Partes para aceitação.
4. Os instrumentos de aceitação em relação a uma emenda devem ser depositados junto ao Depositário. Uma emenda adotada, em conformidade com o parágrafo 3 acima, deve entrar em vigor para as Partes que a tenham aceito no nonagésimo dia após a data de recebimento, pelo Depositário, dos instrumentos de aceitação de pelo menos três quartos das Partes deste Protocolo.
5. A emenda deve entrar em vigor para qualquer outra Parte no nonagésimo dia após a data em que a Parte deposite, junto ao Depositário, seu instrumento de aceitação de tal emenda.

ARTIGO 21

1. Os anexos deste Protocolo constituem parte integrante do mesmo e, salvo se expressamente disposto de outro modo, qualquer referência a este Protocolo constitui ao mesmo tempo referência a qualquer de seus anexos. Qualquer anexo adotado após a entrada em vigor deste Protocolo deve conter apenas listas, formulários e qualquer outro material de natureza descritiva que trate de assuntos de caráter científico, técnico, administrativo ou de procedimento.

2. Qualquer Parte pode elaborar propostas de anexo para este Protocolo e propor emendas a anexos deste Protocolo.
3. Os anexos deste Protocolo e as emendas a anexos deste Protocolo devem ser adotados em sessão ordinária da Conferência das Partes na qualidade de reunião das Partes deste Protocolo. O texto de qualquer proposta de anexo ou de emenda a um anexo deve ser comunicado às Partes pelo Secretariado pelo menos seis meses antes da reunião em que será proposta sua adoção. O texto de qualquer proposta de anexo ou de emenda a um anexo deve também ser comunicado pelo Secretariado às Partes e aos signatários da Convenção e, para informação, ao Depositário.
4. As Partes devem fazer todo o possível para chegar a acordo por consenso sobre qualquer proposta de anexo ou de emenda a um anexo. Uma vez exauridos todos os esforços para chegar a um consenso sem que se tenha chegado a um acordo, o anexo ou a emenda a um anexo devem ser adotados, em última instância, por maioria de três quartos dos votos das Partes presentes e votantes na sessão. Os anexos ou emendas a um anexo adotados devem ser comunicados pelo Secretariado ao Depositário, que deve comunicá-los a todas as Partes para aceitação.
5. Um anexo, ou emenda a um anexo, que não Anexo A ou B, que tenha sido adotado em conformidade com os parágrafos 3 e 4 acima deve entrar em vigor para todas as Partes deste Protocolo seis meses após a data de comunicação a essas Partes, pelo Depositário, da adoção do anexo ou da emenda ao anexo, à exceção das Partes que notificarem o Depositário, por escrito, e no mesmo prazo, de sua não-aceitação do anexo ou da emenda ao anexo. O anexo ou a emenda a um anexo devem entrar em vigor para as Partes que tenham retirado sua notificação de não-aceitação no nonagésimo dia após a data de recebimento, pelo Depositário, da retirada dessa notificação.
6. Se a adoção de um anexo ou de uma emenda a um anexo envolver uma emenda a este Protocolo, esse anexo ou emenda a um anexo não deve entrar em vigor até que entre em vigor a emenda a este Protocolo.
7. As emendas aos Anexos A e B deste Protocolo devem ser adotadas e entrar em vigor em conformidade com os procedimentos descritos no Artigo 20, desde que qualquer emenda ao Anexo B seja adotada mediante o consentimento por escrito da Parte envolvida.

ARTIGO 22

1. Cada Parte tem direito a um voto, à exceção do disposto no parágrafo 2 abaixo.
2. As organizações regionais de integração econômica devem exercer, em assuntos de sua competência, seu direito de voto com um número de votos igual ao número de seus Estados-Membros Partes deste Protocolo. Essas organizações não devem exercer seu direito de voto se qualquer de seus Estados-Membros exercer esse direito e vice-versa.

ARTIGO 23

O Secretário-Geral das Nações Unidas será o Depositário deste Protocolo.

ARTIGO 24

1. Este Protocolo estará aberto a assinatura e sujeito a ratificação, aceitação ou aprovação de Estados e organizações regionais de integração econômica que sejam Partes da Convenção. Estará aberto a assinatura na sede das Nações Unidas em Nova York de 16 de março de 1998 a 15 de março de 1999. Este Protocolo estará aberto a adesões a partir do dia seguinte à data em que não mais estiver aberto a assinaturas. Os instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão devem ser depositados junto ao Depositário.
2. Qualquer organização regional de integração econômica que se torne Parte deste Protocolo, sem que nenhum de seus Estados-Membros seja Parte, deve sujeitar-se a todas as obrigações previstas neste Protocolo. No caso de um ou mais Estados-Membros dessas organizações serem Partes deste Protocolo, a organização e seus Estados-Membros devem decidir sobre suas respectivas responsabilidades pelo desempenho de suas obrigações previstas neste Protocolo. Nesses casos, as organizações e os Estados-Membros não podem exercer simultaneamente direitos estabelecidos por este Protocolo.
3. Em seus instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão, as organizações regionais de integração econômica devem declarar o âmbito de suas competências no tocante a assuntos regidos por este Protocolo. Essas organizações devem também informar ao Depositário qualquer modificação substancial no âmbito de suas competências, o qual, por sua vez, deve transmitir essas informações às Partes.

ARTIGO 25

1. Este Protocolo entra em vigor no nonagésimo dia após a data em que pelo menos 55 Partes da Convenção, englobando as Partes incluídas no Anexo I que contabilizaram no total pelo menos 55 por cento das emissões totais de dióxido de carbono em 1990 das Partes incluídas no Anexo I, tenham depositado seus instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão.
2. Para os fins deste Artigo, "as emissões totais de dióxido de carbono em 1990 das Partes incluídas no Anexo I" significa a quantidade comunicada anteriormente ou na data de adoção deste Protocolo pelas Partes incluídas no Anexo I em sua primeira comunicação nacional, submetida em conformidade com o Artigo 12 da Convenção.
3. Para cada Estado ou organização regional de integração econômica que ratifique, aceite, aprove ou adira a este Protocolo após terem sido reunidas as condições para entrada em vigor descritas no parágrafo 1 acima, este Protocolo entra em vigor no nonagésimo dia após a data de depósito de seu instrumento de ratificação, aceitação, aprovação ou adesão.
4. Para os fins deste Artigo, qualquer instrumento depositado por uma organização regional de integração econômica não deve ser considerado como adicional aos depositados por Estados-Membros da organização.

ARTIGO 26

Nenhuma reserva pode ser feita a este Protocolo.

ARTIGO 27

1. Após três anos da entrada em vigor deste Protocolo para uma Parte, essa Parte pode, a qualquer momento, denunciá-lo por meio de notificação por escrito ao Depositário.
2. Essa denúncia tem efeito um ano após a data de recebimento pelo Depositário da notificação de denúncia, ou em data posterior se assim nela for estipulado.
3. Deve ser considerado que qualquer Parte que denuncie a Convenção denuncia também este Protocolo.

ARTIGO 28

**Adoção do Protocolo de Quioto à
Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima**

A Conferência das Partes,

Tendo revisto o Artigo 4, parágrafo 2(a) e (b) da Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima em sua primeira sessão e tendo concluído que essas alíneas não são adequadas,

Lembrando sua decisão 1/CP.1 intitulada “O Mandato de Berlim: revisão da adequação do artigo 4, parágrafo 2(a) e (b), da Convenção, incluindo propostas relacionadas a um protocolo e decisões sobre acompanhamento”, por meio da qual acordou em iniciar um processo que a possibilitasse tomar as ações apropriadas para o período após 2000 por meio da adoção de um protocolo ou outro instrumento legal em sua terceira sessão,

Lembrando ainda que um dos objetivos do processo foi o de fortalecer os compromissos contidos no Artigo 4, parágrafo 2(a) e (b) da Convenção, para que os países desenvolvidos/outras Partes incluídas no Anexo I, tanto elaborassem políticas e medidas como definissem objetivos quantificados de limitação e redução dentro de prazos estabelecidos, como 2005, 2010 e 2020, para suas emissões antrópicas por fontes e remoções antrópicas por sumidouros dos gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal,

Lembrando também que, de acordo com o Mandato de Berlim, o processo não introduzirá qualquer novo compromisso para as Partes não incluídas no Anexo I, mas reafirmará os compromissos existentes no Artigo 4, parágrafo 1, e continuará fazendo avançar a implementação desses compromissos a fim de atingir o desenvolvimento sustentável, levando em conta o Artigo 4, parágrafos 3, 5 e 7,

Observando os relatórios das oito sessões¹ do Grupo Ad Hoc sobre o Mandato de Berlim,

Tendo considerado com reconhecimento o relatório apresentado pelo Presidente do Grupo Ad Hoc sobre o Mandato de Berlim,

Tomando nota com reconhecimento do relatório do Presidente do Comitê Plenário sobre os resultados do trabalho do Comitê,

Reconhecendo a necessidade de preparar a pronta entrada em vigor do Protocolo de Quioto à Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima,

Ciente da conveniência do início tempestivo dos trabalhos de forma a abrir caminho para o êxito da quarta sessão da Conferência das Partes, que acontecerá em Buenos Aires, Argentina,

1. *Decide* adotar o Protocolo de Quioto à Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima, em anexo;
2. *Solicita* que o Secretário Geral das Nações Unidas seja o Depositário desse Protocolo, abrindo-o para assinatura em Nova York de 16 de março de 1998 a 15 de março de 1999;
3. *Convida* todas as Partes da Convenção-Quadro das Nações Unidas sobre Mudança do Clima a assinar o Protocolo no dia 16 de março de 1998 ou na primeira oportunidade subsequente e depositar instrumentos de ratificação, aceitação ou aprovação, ou instrumentos de adesão, conforme o caso, o mais rápido possível;
4. *Convida ainda* os Estados que não são Partes da Convenção a ratificar ou a ela aderir, conforme o caso, sem demora, a fim de que possam tornar-se Partes do Protocolo;

 - (a) Determinação de modalidades, regras e diretrizes sobre como e quais atividades adicionais induzidas pelo homem relacionadas a variações nas emissões por fontes e remoções por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa nas categorias de solos agrícolas e de mudança no uso da terra e florestas devem ser adicionadas, ou subtraídas, das quantidades atribuídas para as Partes do Protocolo incluídas no Anexo I da Convenção, como estabelecido no Artigo 3, parágrafo 4, do Protocolo;
 - (b) Definição dos princípios, das modalidades, regras e diretrizes apropriados, em particular para verificação, elaboração de relatório e prestação de contas do comércio de emissões, conforme o Artigo 17 do Protocolo;
 - (c) Elaboração de diretrizes para que qualquer Parte do Protocolo incluída no Anexo I da Convenção transfira ou adquira de qualquer outra dessas Partes unidades de redução de emissão resultantes de projetos com o objetivo de reduzir emissões antrópicas por fontes ou aumentar remoções antrópicas por sumidouros de gases de efeito estufa em qualquer setor da economia, como estabelecido no Artigo 6 do Protocolo;
 - (d) Consideração e, conforme o caso, adoção de ações sobre metodologias apropriadas para tratar da situação das Partes listadas no Anexo B do Protocolo para as quais projetos isolados teriam um efeito proporcional significativo sobre as emissões no período de compromisso;
 - (e) Análise das implicações do Artigo 12, parágrafo 10, do Protocolo;
6. *Convida* o Presidente do Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico e o Presidente do Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação a fazer uma proposta conjunta para esses órgãos, em suas oitavas sessões, sobre a designação a eles de trabalho preparatório para permitir

A Conferência das Partes,

Lembrando suas decisões 4/CP.1 e 9/CP.2,

Endossando as conclusões relevantes do Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico em sua quarta sessão,¹

1. *Reafirma* que as Partes devem utilizar as Diretrizes Revisadas de 1996 para Inventários Nacionais de Gases de Efeito Estufa do Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima para estimar e relatar as emissões antrópicas por fontes e as remoções antrópicas por sumidouros dos gases de efeito estufa não controlados pelo Protocolo de Montreal;
2. *Afirma* que as emissões efetivas de hidrofluorcarbonos, perfluorcarbonos e hexafluoreto de enxofre devem ser estimadas, quando houver dados disponíveis, e utilizadas na preparação dos relatórios de emissões. As Partes devem esforçar-se ao máximo para desenvolver as fontes de dados necessárias;
3. *Reafirma* que os potenciais de aquecimento global utilizados pelas Partes devem ser os fornecidos pelo Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima em seu Segundo Relatório de Avaliação ("1995 IPCC GWP values" - valores do potencial de aquecimento global estabelecidos em 1995 pelo IPCC) com base nos efeitos dos gases de efeito estufa considerados em um horizonte de 100 anos, levando em conta as incertezas inerentes e complexas envolvidas nas estimativas dos potenciais de aquecimento global. Além disso, apenas a título de informação, as Partes também podem fazer uso de um outro horizonte de tempo, como estipulado no Segundo Relatório de Avaliação;
4. *Lembra* que, de acordo com a versão revisada de 1996 das Diretrizes para Inventários Nacionais de Gases de Efeito Estufa do Painel Intergovernamental sobre Mudança do Clima, as emissões baseadas em combustível vendido a navios ou aeronaves do transporte internacional não devem ser incluídas nos totais nacionais, mas relatadas separadamente; e incita o Órgão Subsidiário de Assessoramento Científico e Tecnológico a definir melhor a inclusão dessas emissões nos inventários gerais de gases de efeito estufa das Partes;
5. *Decide* que as emissões resultantes de operações multilaterais conforme a Carta das Nações Unidas não devem ser incluídas nos totais nacionais, mas relatadas separadamente; outras emissões relacionadas a operações devem ser incluídas nos totais nacionais das emissões de uma ou mais Partes envolvidas.

1. *Solicita* ao Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação, em sua oitava sessão, que inicie um processo de identificação e determinação de ações necessárias para suprir as necessidades específicas das Partes países em desenvolvimento, especificadas no Artigo 4, parágrafos 8 e 9, da Convenção, resultantes de efeitos adversos da mudança do clima e/ou do efeito da implementação de medidas de resposta. As questões a serem consideradas devem incluir ações relacionadas com a obtenção de fundos, seguro e transferência de tecnologia;
2. *Solicita ainda* ao Órgão Subsidiário de Implementação que informe à Conferência das Partes, em sua quarta sessão, os resultados desse processo;
3. *Convida* a Conferência das Partes, em sua quarta sessão, a tomar uma decisão sobre ações com base nas conclusões e recomendações desse processo.

Medium-Term Mitigation for Long-Term Stabilization

New research at the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA)

Substantial climate change impacts are anticipated to emerge over the coming decades—and even more significant ones over the coming centuries—while effective response strategies must be initiated in the shorter term and sustained over decades or longer. Thus, climate change dictates a long time horizon and a global perspective that need to be effectively linked to near-term strategies at the local, national, and regional levels.

IIASA has started a research initiative that builds on its expertise in global and long-term analyses of population, technology, energy systems, and agriculture, and integrates it with the more site-specific and short- to medium-term assessments of land use, forestry, and air pollution for both industrialized and developing countries.

To bridge the global and long-term nature of climate change and the medium-term policy perspectives of national decision makers, IIASA's new research initiative aims at integrative responses to the following questions:

- How do appropriate mitigation portfolios across gases and sectors vary as a function of different stabilization levels, differences in socioeconomic development pathways, technology availability and costs, policy instruments chosen, and the degree of cooperative behavior among agents?
- What are, for different policy objectives, efficient sets of medium-term mitigation options for different countries that correspond to a selected global long-term strategy? How can synergies with other policy areas be maximized?

While the work is still in progress, first results illustrate the envisaged scope of IIASA's research activities.

Global Long-Term Strategies for Stabilizing GHG Concentrations

Nebosja Nakicenovic (naki@iiasa.ac.at)

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has formulated a range of long-term greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions scenarios in its Special Report on Emissions Scenarios (SRES), exploring alternative future socioeconomic development paths ("story lines"). Based on these scenarios, IIASA has now focused on strategies for achieving stabilization of atmospheric GHG concentrations. The new tool for scenario analysis developed for this purpose covers all six GHGs considered in the Kyoto Protocol and includes emissions from all anthropogenic sources. Thus, IIASA's interdisciplinary approach brings together in-depth analyses for the energy (IIASA's MESSAGE model), agricultural, and forestry sectors.

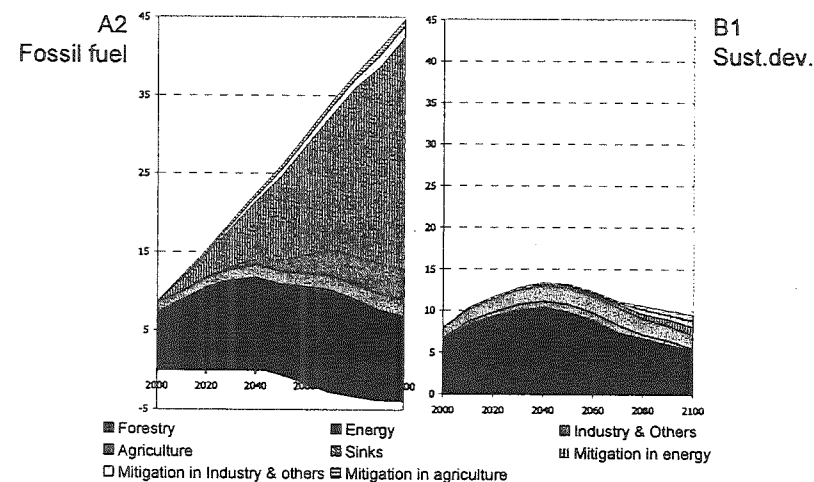


Figure 1: Global GHG emissions for two IPCC SRES scenarios. A2 is a fossil-intensive future with relatively high annual emissions of some 45 gigatons carbon (GtC) (equivalent) by the year 2100. The B1 development path is more sustainable, with annual emissions peaking at some 14 GtC (equivalent) during the 2040s followed by a decline to less than 9 GtC (equivalent) annually by 2100. The color emissions paths designate the three main sectors—energy, agriculture, and forestry. The shaded black-and-white areas designate mitigation measures and options required to achieve stabilization of concentrations. The reductions are significantly higher in the fossil-intensive development baseline, leading to high mitigation costs.

Initial work explored stabilization strategies that limit the (global mean) temperature increase by the year 2100 to 2.3°C compared with preindustrial levels. This illustrative analysis was conducted for two of the four alternative development paths ("story lines") that have been analyzed in the IPCC SRES report: a fossil-intensive scenario (SRES A2) and a more sustainable development path scenario (SRES B1) (see Figure 1).

Both stabilization scenarios depict cost-effective multi-gas mitigation strategies that encompass the uncertainties and feedbacks among the energy, agricultural, and forest sectors. One of the main results of this illustrative analysis is that diversified portfolios of mitigation options that include the abatement of non-CO₂ gases are considerably cheaper than those that focus on CO₂ emission reductions only. In addition, fossil-intensive futures, which are often associated with slow rates of innovation, technology transfer, and diffusion, lead to significantly higher costs for achieving climate stabilization compared with more sustainable futures, which usually

include a combination of mitigation measures. One essential difference is that sustainable development paths require significantly less-intensive mitigation efforts, explaining the lower costs for achieving stabilization. Another important result is the significant co-benefit of GHG (multi-gas) mitigation on the reduction of black carbon and organic carbon emissions. The transitional phase over the short to medium term up to the 2030s will play a key role.

Medium-Term Potentials and Costs of National GHG Mitigation Options

Fabian Wagner (wagnerf@iiasa.ac.at)

A new line of IIASA's work assesses the medium-term potentials and costs for greenhouse gas (GHG) mitigation for individual countries. This analysis takes national projections of economic activities as a starting point, puts them into perspective with global stabilization strategies, and quantifies the country-specific potentials and costs for mitigating the six Kyoto gases (CO₂, CH₄, N₂O, HFC, PFC, SF₆). For each of these gases, the analysis considers the full range of mitigation options and explores their application potential up to the year 2030. It takes into account the interactions between mitigation measures for different GHGs and their side impacts on air pollutants.

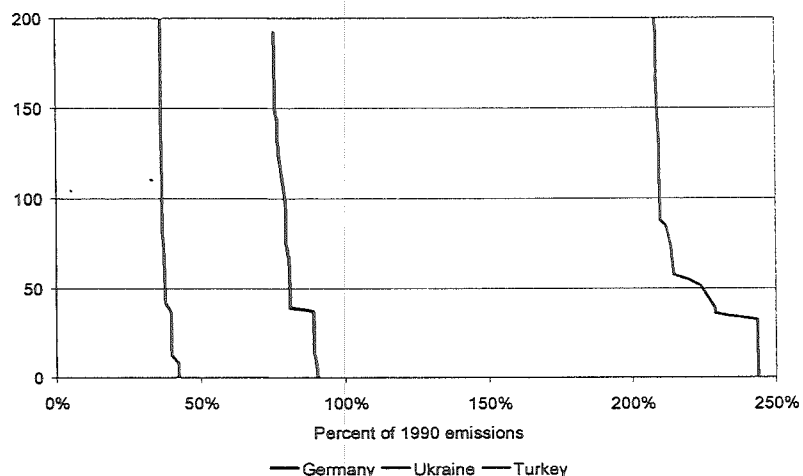


Figure 2: Cost curves for CO₂ for Germany, Ukraine, and Turkey for the year 2020 (marginal costs, €/t CO₂).

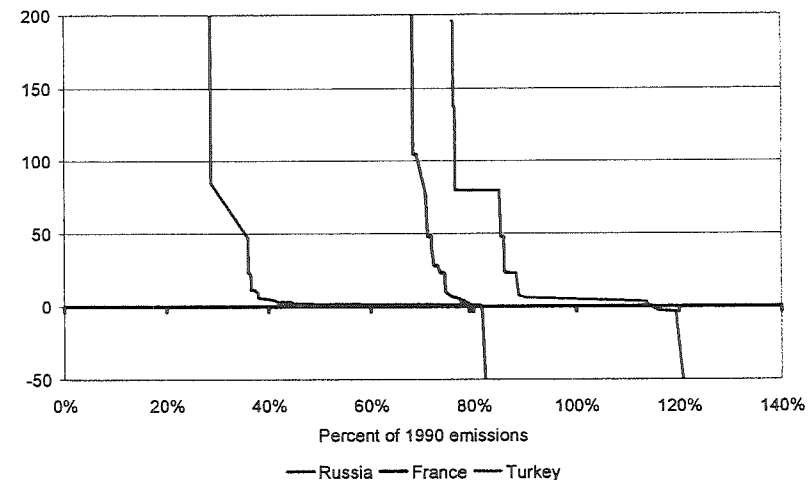


Figure 3: Cost curves for CH₄ for Russia, France, and Turkey for the year 2020 (marginal costs, €/t CO₂ equivalent).

The new Greenhouse gas Air Pollution Interactions and Synergies (GAINS) model considers more than 160 practical mitigation options for CO₂, approximately 30 measures for CH₄, and 20 options each for N₂O and the F-gases (HFC, PFC, SF₆). It estimates the resource costs of these mitigation measures to society. To the maximum possible extent, the GAINS approach follows the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) methodology for emission estimates and relies on the national submissions of GHG emission inventories to the UNFCCC. Technical features and cost data for mitigation options are taken from the peer-reviewed literature.

The resulting cost curves (examples are shown in Figures 2 and 3) show vastly different mitigation potentials and costs for the various gases and countries, reflecting the structural differences of national economies and the different development paths foreseen by the national governments.

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Medium-Term Multi-Gas Mitigation Strategies

Ger Klaassen (klaassen@iiasa.ac.at)

Based on country-specific estimates of medium-term greenhouse gas (GHG) mitigation potentials and costs, the new GAINS tool allows the assessment of the distributional aspects, cost-effectiveness, and environmental efficiency of alternative strategies for GHG stabilization. Starting from the national perspectives of economic development, GAINS explores, for individual countries, the implications of medium-term multi-gas mitigation strategies that are compatible with global long-term stabilization strategies.

As an illustration, an initial analysis explores the costs of a 15% reduction in GHG emissions beyond the current baseline projection for all European countries for 2020.

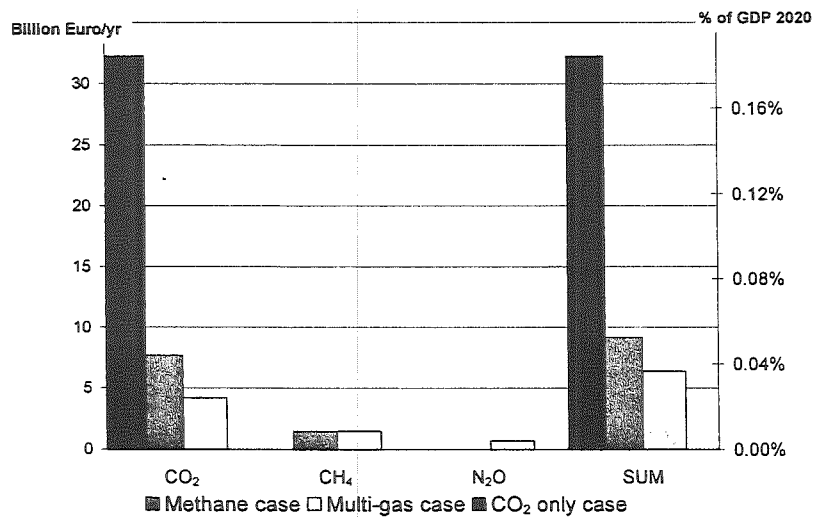


Figure 4: Costs of the multi-gas mitigation strategies in 2020.

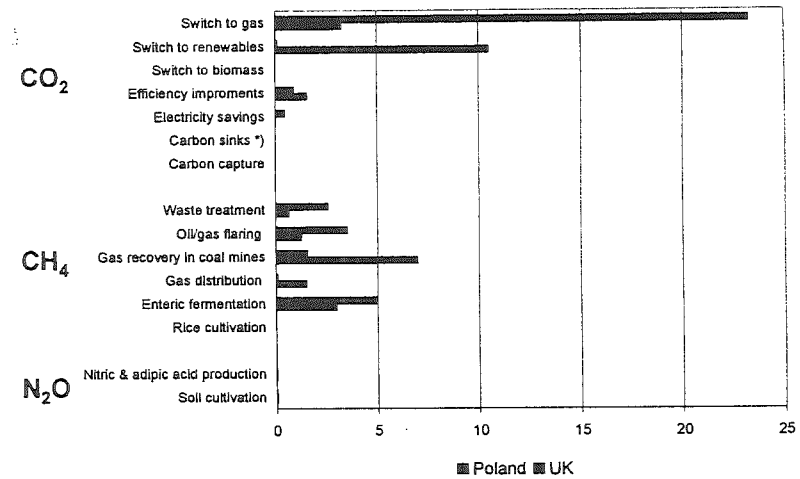


Figure 5: Portfolios of mitigation measures for the multi-gas (CO₂, CH₄, and N₂O) case for Poland and the UK (Mt CO₂ equivalent).

Achieving these reductions exclusively through CO₂ mitigation implies costs of approximately 30 billion euros per year, or 0.18% of the gross domestic product (GDP) in 2020 (Figure 4).

If the same cut of total GHG emissions (in terms of CO₂ equivalents) is achieved through CO₂ and CH₄ reductions, costs drop to approximately 9 billion euros per year; including measures for N₂O emissions in the portfolio cuts costs to approximately 6 billion euros per year (or 0.04% of the GDP in 2020).

GAINS allows the portfolios of mitigation measures that contribute to the achievement of a selected global stabilization target in the most cost-effective way to be identified for the countries included in its databases (Figure 5). Reflecting the structural differences in national economies and the different development objectives of individual countries, significant variations in the national mitigation portfolios emerge.

Synergies between GHG Mitigation and Air Pollution Control

Greenhouse gases (GHGs) and air pollutants originate from the same sources, interact in the atmosphere, and cause a wide range of environmental impacts. The GAINS model quantifies the physical and economic linkages between the emissions of these gases to facilitate the design of emission control strategies that maximize the synergies between GHG mitigation and air pollution control. The GAINS GHG assessment links to the RAINS integrated assessment model for air pollution that has been implemented for Europe and Southeast Asia.

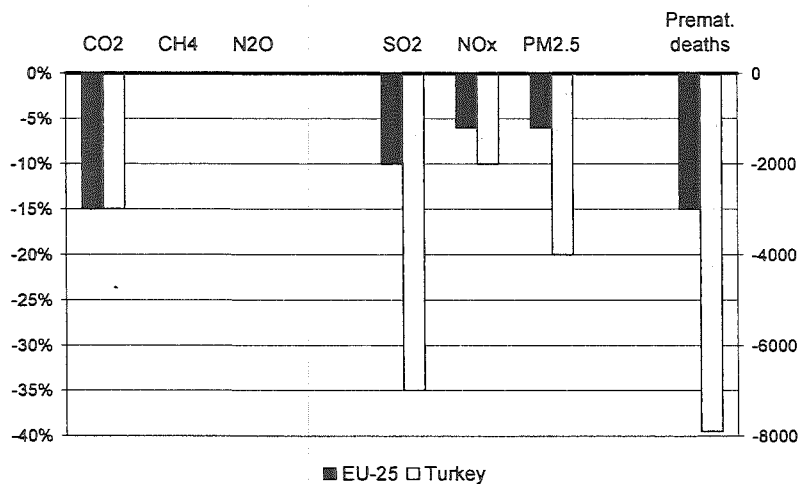


Figure 6: Fuel shift strategies to reduce CO₂ emissions simultaneously cut emissions of air pollutants, both in industrialized countries with stringent emission controls in place (EU-25) and in rapidly developing economies (e.g., Turkey). The accompanying improvements in air quality can prevent several thousands of premature deaths.

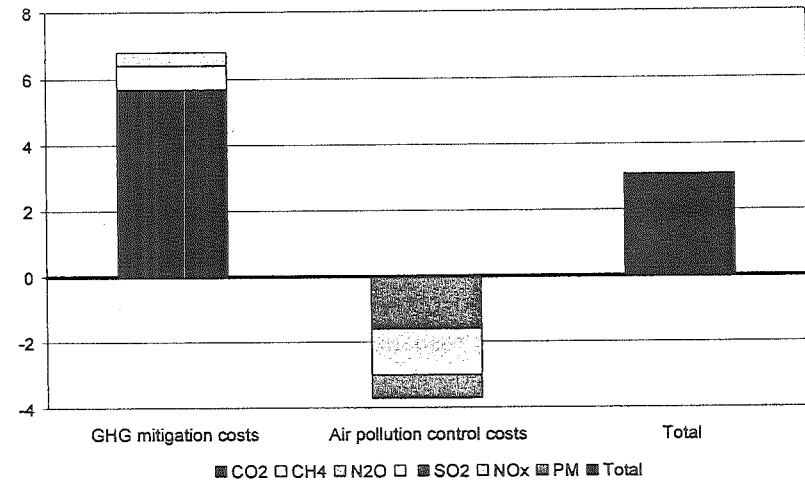


Figure 7: In countries with stringent air pollution controls, GHG reductions can avoid significant costs for air pollution control measures (here, the costs of the multi-gas case for the EU-25 compared with baseline costs, in billion euros per year).

The initial GAINS analysis suggests considerable co-benefits in terms of both environmental impacts (e.g., human health—see Figure 6) and economics (avoided air pollution control costs—see Figure 7). Most important, unlike the long-term responses of global climate to local GHG mitigation efforts, these co-benefits occur in the medium term and close to the places where mitigation action is taken. Thus, such concrete co-benefits are of immediate interest to today's decision makers in both industrialized and developing countries.

In its final form, the GAINS model will allow the design of pollution control policies that simultaneously meet local air-quality objectives while minimizing the emissions of GHGs.

The Impacts of Ozone Precursor Emissions on Radiative Forcing and Background Ozone

Frank Raes, Joint Research Centre (JRC), Ispra (frank.raes@jrc.it)

Methane (CH₄) and ozone (O₃) are both key components driving climate change and atmospheric chemistry. Overall, the combined effect of increasing CH₄ and other precursor emissions of ozone (CO, NMVOC, and NO_x) has resulted in elevated tropospheric ozone levels (compared with preindustrial levels), associated with a net radiative forcing of about 0.35 watts per square meter (W/m²). Recent epidemiological studies detect significant negative health impacts from ozone at low concentrations, even at current Northern Hemispheric background levels. Thus, the increasing hemispheric ozone background concentrations are of immediate concern to air-quality managers throughout the world.

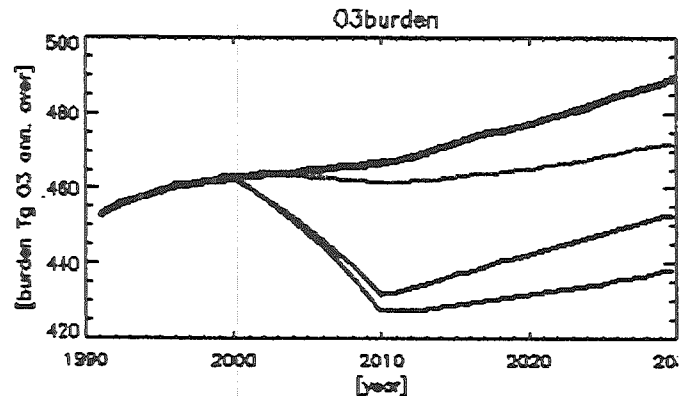


Figure 8: Global ozone burden from the “current legislation” case (black line), the maximum technically feasible methane reductions (green line), the maximum feasible reductions of NO_x and VOC emissions (blue line), and the maximum feasible reductions of all ozone precursor emissions (red line).

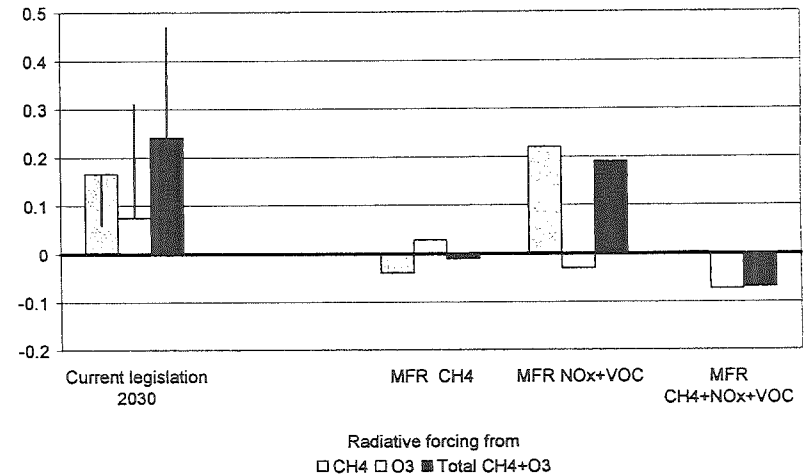


Figure 9: Changes in radiative forcing (W/m²) in response to changes in ozone precursor emissions between the 1990s and 2020s estimated with the TM3 model for the “current legislation” case and the three maximum feasible emission control scenarios.

To explore the response of tropospheric ozone and radiative forcing to changes in ozone precursor emissions (CH₄, CO, NMVOC, and NO_x), we implemented two global emission scenarios up to 2030 in two global chemistry transport models. For the “current legislation” case, the models indicate an increase of the annual average ozone levels in the Northern Hemisphere from the 1990s to the 2020s by 5 parts per billion by volume (ppbv). The corresponding higher ozone and methane burdens in the atmosphere increase radiative forcing by approximately 0.2 W/m². Full application of today’s emission control technologies, however, would bring ozone down below the levels experienced in the 1990s and would reduce the current radiative forcing of ozone and methane by approximately 0.1 W/m². While methane reductions lead to lower ozone burdens and to less radiative forcing, further reductions of the air pollutants NO_x and VOC result in lower ozone, but at the same time increase the lifetime of methane. Control of methane emissions appears to be an efficient option to reduce tropospheric ozone as well as radiative forcing.

About the Presenters

Markus Amann is leader of the Atmospheric Pollution Program and the Greenhouse Gas Initiative at IIASA. He also serves as the head of the Centre for Integrated Assessment Modelling (CIAM) of the European Monitoring and Evaluation Programme (EMEP) under the Convention on Long-Range Transboundary Air Pollution (CLRTAP) and has been appointed a member of the Clean Air Commission of the Austrian Academy of Sciences.

Ger Klaassen has been coordinating research on including the costs of controlling greenhouse gas emissions in IIASA's Transboundary Air Pollution Project since October 2003. Previously, he led projects on carbon trading, energy infrastructures, energy supply and demand, and innovation within IIASA's Environmentally Compatible Energy Strategies Project. From 1996 to mid-1998, Dr. Klaassen worked at the Directorate-General for the Environment of the European Commission in Brussels as an expert on the economic aspects of climate, energy, and air-quality policies.

Fabian Wagner joined the Atmospheric Pollution Program in May 2004 to work on aspects of implementing non-CO₂ greenhouse gases into the RAINS model. Previously, he was employed as a postdoctoral researcher at the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, California, was a consultant to the UNFCCC secretariat in Bonn, and was a visiting scientist in the Climate Policy group of the Hamburg Institute of International Economics (HWWA), Germany. Most recently he has been a programme officer for the IPCC National Greenhouse Gas Inventories Programme at the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies in Hayama, Japan.

Nebojsa Nakicenovic is leader of the Transitions to New Technologies Program and Greenhouse Gas Initiative at IIASA, and Professor of Energy Economics at the Vienna University of Technology. He is an associate editor of the *International Journal on Technological Forecasting and Social Change*, editor of the *International Journal on Energy, and Climate Policy*, coordinating lead author for the IPCC, and coordinating lead author of the Millennium Ecosystem Assessment.

Frank Raes has been with the European Commission Joint Research Centre (JRC), in Ispra, Italy, since 1987, where he performs research on the physics and chemistry of atmospheric aerosols. He has been the head of the Climate Change Unit in the Institute for Environment and Sustainability of the JRC since 1999.

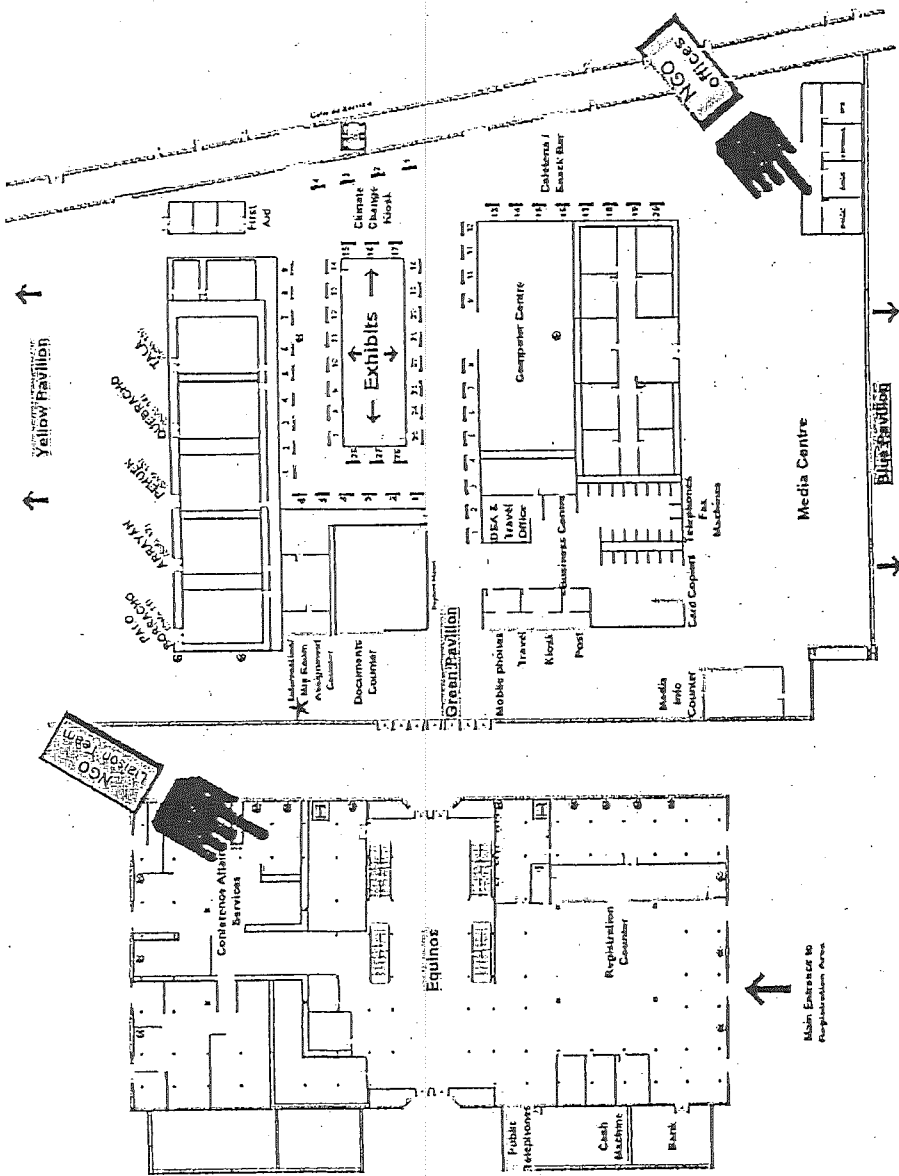
